LINDSAY, INDIAN TERRITORY

The town of Lindsay, in the Chickasaw nation, located about half way between Chickasha and Paula Valley at the connection of the Santa Fe and Rock Island railroads, is destined to become one of the best towns in the country. Scarcely a year old yet, today it has a population of 1,000 people and contains some magnificent brick business houses, handsome residences and churches are comfortable school buildings.

With reference to other railroad towns, Lindsay is splendidly located, being almost equidistant from Purcell, Paula Valley and Chickasha. Its growth has been like magic and already the Santa Fe has had to make additions to its depot buildings in order to handle the passenger and freight traffic.

The rich Washita valley whose productivity is known the country over extends for miles in every direction. It is claimed for this valley that its productions of corn, cotton and the cereals surpasses any other section west of the Mississippi river, and as one of the striking evidences, thrifty farmers who live in better homes than in any other section of the Indian Territory surround the town of Lindsay.

Waterfalls on the historic Washita within two miles of the town furnish the source for power sufficient not only for every need in Lindsay but an amount sufficient to light with electricity and run all the machinery in every town between Chickasha and Paula Valley.

The town contains fine brick and stone business houses, two banks, round and square bale cotton gins, a weekly newspaper, a live commercial club, and the town has been incorporated and is in the hands of progressive city officers.

No factions divide the town and every citizen joins the others toward the material progress of the town.

Lots that sold for a small sum a few months ago are now worth four and five times as much, and real estate is now cheap enough when compared with the importance of the town and will double in value within six months.

Many Ardmore people are in Lindsay, some of whom have made snug little fortunes in the mercantile business and in the advancement of their landed holdings.

A. W. Bell, formerly with Noble Bros. of Ardmore, is there engaging in the hardware, implement and furniture business. His building fronts 100 feet on Main street, has a basement and is double decked in order to accommodate his big stock.

C. M. Sholer, a former Ardmore barber, is there with a three chair shop in his own building on Main street and will begin within a brief time to equip a bath house in connection.

E. J. Stillwell, well known here, owns a beautiful home together with 150 feet frontage on Main street and is now preparing to embark in business.

A. C. Phelps, formerly of Norman, O. T., is one of the progressive merchants of the town and is president of the commercial club to whom all communications with reference to the town should be addressed.

D. M. Wallace, an old newspaper man, formerly with the Railway Register of Topeka, Kansas, is a prosperous contractor and builder of Lindsay.

W. E. Brown, formerly of Purcell, has a well equipped planing mill and is getting a liberal share of the profits that are being picked up by the pioneers in business.

George C. and Mark P. Robinson, former Iowa business men, are there conducting a large hardware, implement and vehicle business under the firm name of Robinson Bros. Their house is as old as the town and enjoys a splendid patronage.

D. C. Hart conducts a large general merchandise store. He was for many years district clerk of Montague county, Texas, and has many friends in Ardmore.

Lindsay owes much of its growth to T. D. Wagner, vice president of one of the national banks and a dealer in real estate.

Neil Smith, a former business man of Leon and later of Lexington, O. T., conducts a large general merchandise house.

Dewese & Brumley, former merchants of Baum, have a large store there and own much valuable property.

S. H. Penn, the mayor, is an old Texan and a friend of the proprietor of the Ardmoreite. He is as true as steel and is always found heading the ranks of those who are working for a better Lindsay.

The Kentucky, Oklahoma and Indian Territory Land and Investment Co., under the presidency of J. E. Wright,

is a potent factor in the building up of the town and country.

Geo. B. Rennie of Paula Valley, a popular and reliable citizen, has recently connected himself with this company.
