

A CUTTING AFFRAY.

Loyd Anderson Carved Up By Tom Johnson in a Street Fight.

Loyd Anderson was seriously cut Friday night, with a knife, about 11 o'clock. Tom Johnson is in jail charged with the cutting. The exact cause of the trouble is not known, but it is reported that they had quarreled in the Dew Drop joint and came out on the street where the fight occurred. It is thought probable that both parties were drinking.

Anderson was taken to the sanitarium where an examination of his wounds was made.

Dr. Hard stated yesterday that Anderson was cut over and around the left eye down the face to the chin, severing the temple and facial arteries and cutting the under-lip almost off, all these incisions going to the bone. There was also two stab wounds between the sixth and eighth ribs to the hollow on the left side. The doctor stated that although Anderson was somewhat improved he would withhold his prognosis of the outcome for the present.

The knife with which the cutting was done was found on the street by the police where it was supposed to have been thrown by Johnson.

Johnson was placed in jail last night by Deputy Havens, his bond being set at \$1,000.

The case has not been set for trial as the condition of Anderson is such as to entertain doubt as to his outcome.
