## MORE CHARGES ON BURTON

## SENATOR ACCUSED OF PRESSING INDIAN CLAIMS.

Before the Department Reported Fees \$14,000—Used Brothers Name to Hide Personality—Warrants Are in Evidence.

Washington, Aug. 24.—A report compiled by special agents of the government, which seriously involves United States Senator J. Ralph Burton of Kansas on charges of profiting to the extent of about \$14,000 by pressing Indian claims before the interior department, was today rendered to the department of justice.

The report is the result of the investigation that has been in progress for several months into irregularities in manipulating Chickasaw national fund and school warrants in the Chickasaw nation, as a consequence of which several indictments have already been found at Muskogee.

It is understood here that Senator Burton's alleged connection with Chickasaw affairs was discovered when probing into the school warrant scandal.

The facts set forth in the report place Senator Burton in a relation to the interior department similar to that in which he acted before the postoffice department when representing the Rialto Grain and Securities Company of St. Louis. In this latter case he was indicted and convicted, though the cause was remanded for a new trial by the supreme court. The second trial is expected to take place in St. Louis next fall.

Senator Burton's conduct in the Securities company case and in this new matter which has arisen, is held to be in violation of section 1781 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, which makes it a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$10,000 or imprisonment for a senator or representative to appear before a government department in a case in which the government is interested.

In substance the report puts the department of justice in possession of a list of twenty-six Chickasaw national fund warrants, which, the report declares, were issued to Senator Burton and Z. T. Burton for services as attorneys. The warrants aggregate nearly \$14,000. They were all issued during the term of Senator Burton's senatorial service.

Six of the warrants, bearing date of October 22, 1901, it appears, were issued to J. R. Burton direct and amounted to \$5,500. The others were issued to Z. T. Burton, who, according to the information supplied to the department of justice, was nothing more than the alter ego of Senator Burton.

This name is alleged to have been used simply to cover up the part played by Senator Burton. It is declared that Z. T. Burton had no practice in the Indian territory, and did no actual work before the interior department at Washington.

The report is also known to include testimony from Superintendent Benedict of the Indian schools at Muskogee who is made to say that on one occasion when he came to Washington to look after a matter concerning the Indian Territory, Senator Burton told him that he (Burton) alone was authorized to represent the Indians at the interior department.

Assistant Attorney General Robb, the acting attorney general, said tonight that the report had not yet reached him. It is, however, known in disputation that the report is completed, and has been forwarded to the attorney general.

What action may follow on the score of the alleged facts is problematical. It is not believed that they can be used against Senator Burton at St. Louis unless another indictment shall be found.

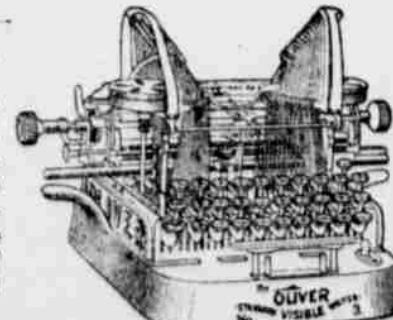
