## THE HARVEST FESTIVAL

ANNUAL THANKSGIVING SEASON OF SALVATION ARMY.

From September 23 to 26 Inclusive During Which Time Any Gift or Donation, Great or Small, Will Be Gladly Accepted.

There is probably no section of the country, certainly no community or class, that has not been permeated by the influence of The Salvation Army, the organization that never ceases in its work, but adapts itself to all times, seasons and places. It has converts and friends in every town and village in the land.

Because of this in all seasons, what- ever the Army's special efforts may be, there is always throughout the country an interest quick to respond. While the cold of winter and early spring are with us we hear of the Army's gigantic operations in supplying coal, clothing and sustenance to the very poor; when the summer is under way we learn of the noble charities in the way of fresh air camps, outings, excursions and the like, as also penny ice wagons; and then with the coming of fall there is the annual Harvest Festival, the year's last special effort before the huge Christmas dinner for the poor.

Confronting us just now is the Harvest Festival, the date of which is set from September 23 to 26 inclusive, and for the celebration of which the local corps is making special preparation. The character of this annual event is too well known to require any definition. It is, in fact, a special season of thanksgiving and yielding to God for His use in the Army anything and everything that may have either money value or that can be put to practical use.

No gift or donation can come amiss, as a guide to its friends the Army mentions the following articles as being easily available by its several departments.

We append a full list of articles asked for:

Fruits, flowers, canned goods, vegetables, meat chickens, corn, co- coas, books, pictures, shoes, jewelry, coal, wood, tools, breakfast foods, wheat, furniture (new or old), clothing (new or second hand) oatmeal, condensed milk, bread, crackers, cheese, tea, coffee, flour, lumber, shingles, chairs, sheets, stationery, hats, boots, cutlery, dry goods, musical instruments. At first glance they may appear to be an almost laughable incongruity about this list, but when it is remembered what a widely diversified field of activity the Army covers, it does not appear that the list is so incongruous. It must be remembered that besides the 742 corps, outposts and slum posts, the Army maintains 78 shelters for men and women, 61 industrial homes for the unemployed and disheartened, 23 rescue homes for fallen women, 29 slum settlements, where nearly 100 noble, heroic young women labor; a

farm colonies, employment bureaus, relief stores and a half dozen or more activities—all these scattered over the United States from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Nine hundred thousand dollars are spent annually upon the poor of the United States. The Army shelters annually give housing and comfort to something like 3,000,000 souls. Three thousand, three hundred and fifty-one women entered our rescue homes last year, and ninety-three per cent were restored to lives of virtue.

The sum of money necessary yearly to meet such diverse and growing demands cannot but be very large, and it is in the hope of contributing to ward it the Army holds its Harvest Festival.

We of this community are called a generous people. Let us make good the claim by giving largely to this noble work.

### DISTRICT COURT TERMS.

Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore Will Have Three Terms Each.

Judge Townsend has made the following order or court with reference to the terms of District court to be held at Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore:

In compliance with the provisions of an act of congress entitled "An act providing for additional United States judges in the Indian territory" and for other purposes, approved April 28, 1904, it is ordered:

That there shall be three terms of court each year at the following places in the said Southern district: Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore, as provided by law, same beginning as follows:

Marietta—First term, beginning October 2, 1905.

Marietta—Second term, beginning October 12, 1905.

Tishomingo—First term, beginning October 23, 1905.

Tishomingo—Second term, beginning November 13, 1905.

Ardmore—First term, beginning December 4, 1905.

Ardmore—Second term, beginning January 2, 1906.

Third Term.

Marietta—Beginning January 25, 1906.

Tishomingo—Beginning February 12, 1906.

Ardmore—Beginning March 26, 1906.
