DISTRICT COURT TERMS.

Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore
Will Have Three Terms Each.

Judge Townsend has made the following order of court with reference to the terms of district court to be held at Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore:

In compliance with the provisions of an act of congress entitled "An act providing for additional United States Judges in the Indian Territory" and for other purposes, approved April 28, 1904, it is ordered:

That there shall be three terms of court each year at the following places in the said Southern district: Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore, as provided by law, same beginning as follows:

Marietta—First term, beginning October 2, 1905.

Marietta—Second term, beginning October 12, 1905.

Tishomingo—First term, beginning October 23, 1905.

Tishomingo—Second term, beginning November 13, 1905.

Ardmore—First term, beginning December 4, 1905.

Ardmore—Second term, beginning January 2, 1906.

Third Term.

Marietta—Beginning January 25, 1906.

Tishomingo—Beginning February 12, 1906.

Ardmore—Beginning March 26, 1906.

Done in chambers at Ardmore, Indian Territory, this 24th day of April, 1905.

Attorney Johnson Speaks.

In a recent interview with the Post at Washington, D. C., that paper says: W. B. Johnson, district attorney for the Southern District of Indian Territory, is in the city on business with the department of justice. Mr. Johnson is originally from Kentucky, and he has the distinction of being one of the five men who organized the Republican party in Texas, and called the first convention fifteen years ago. Speaking of his present home, he said: "Ardmore, the seat of the court for the Chickasaw nation, is now the greatest local cotton market of the world. Last year we handled 40,000 bales of cotton. What we need principally in the Indian Territory is industry, but at present, with the restrictions to prevent the Indians selling land, no capitalists will go there, for they do not want to rent land. The people in the Territory are intensely fond of President Roosevelt. He is just the kind of man that appeals to them."

"We have no government there to obtain anything for us, and the railroads have been charging up anything that they pleased. But when he informed legislation for controlling their rates he struck the right spot with the residents and won them all the more to his side."

"Our country is among the finest in the United States for agricultural purposes. Almost anything will grow in the land. Some day, I venture to predict, Indian Territory will be the garden of the United States."

Praises Ardmore.

Mr. Frank Cain, one of the advance representatives of the Forepaugh-Sells big circus, was in the city this morning in connection with the coming of the show next Friday. He states that the circus is the best and biggest that has ever visited this section of the country and says that many new features have been added this year that will be pleasing to the people. The circus will give the usual street parade. It was reported, he said, that the show had abandoned this important feature but such is not the case, he declared.

Mr. Cain likes Ardmore which town, he declared, was one of the very best he had visited this season. "Your merchants are progressive and enterprising," he said. "Your stores would be a credit to many of the larger towns. The stocks they carry are up-to-date in every way and I was rather surprised at the amount of business the merchants do here. I understand that the volume is greater in Ardmore than in any town in the territory and that it is the leading cotton market in the two territories."

Mr. Cain was of the opinion that Ardmore has an excellent future. "Everywhere I have been the people are greatly interested in statehood. I find the sentiment in this section of the country strong for single statehood, while in the Creek nation there is an element fighting for two states."

Mr. Cain said that crops in this section of the country were very good and much better than in many portions of Texas.
