 Twenty Thousand Dollars Asked for  
 Grew out of Killing of Mullen.

In the United States clerk's office,  
 Potter, Bowman and Potter have filed  
 suit against the city in behalf of Mrs.  
 W. E. Mullen, widow of the late W.  
 E. Mullen who was killed through an  
 explosion at the waterworks. Twenty  
 thousand dollars is sued for. The pe-

**Wreck on Santa Fe.**  
 Fort Worth, Tex., Nov. 13.—North-  
 bound passenger No. 18, due here at  
 7:50 o'clock this morning, was wrecked  
 early this morning two miles north  
 of Alvarado. The engine and entire
