THE WOMAN WITH NO HEART

BAPTIST PASTOR THUS DENOMINATES THE NEW WOMAN.

This Minister of the Gospel Declares She is an Abomination. Because She Destroys the Possibility of Being a Lover.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The "new woman" was pilloried and the pastoral scourge laid upon her back in a sermon delivered in the Fifth Street Baptist church by its pastor, Rev. Western Bruner. The theme was "The New Woman an Abomination."

The pastor has caused many of the society and club women in his congregation to wince at his stings. Many after the sermon said that they felt some things said had been directed at them personally. Here is what the pastor said.

"The 'new woman' is an abomination, because she destroys the possibility of being a lover, and a woman without a heart is not a woman.

"There are three types of this abomination, one of the greatest, in my opinion, of this age. The first is the woman with children, a husband and a home, who neglects all three of them for the sake of the club, the drawing room and the 'temple of pleasure.' The wider liberty of this age grants men and women a certain license, but it saps the real liberty and makes one a slave to home destroying influences. Our own city is not free from this evil.

"The second class is that of the woman, married or single, who neglects her home duties to emphasize to the world 'women's rights.' This type is a distinct menace to society. She would blot and destroy God's most glorious picture.

"The third type of this abomination is the 'childless wife.' She is too often seen in the well fed, tastefully gowned and handsomely brought up dame, who can not bear the burden of looking after children, as such an occupation would interfere with her own privileges.

"Such a type is only too common in our large cities and in the very heart of their fashionable sections. This kind of woman destroys the possibility of being a lover, and a woman with out a heart is not a woman. The thing for which God created woman was the bringing up and guidance of the little babe, and motherhood is the greatest triumph there is. The ideals of a man, I have been told by men themselves, are largely determined by the ideals of woman. Man will sink or rise to her standard."

DISTRICT COURT TERMS.

Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore Judge Townsend has made the following order or court with reference to the terms of dist. court to be held at Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore: In compliance with the provisions of an act of congress entitled "An act providing for additional United States judges in the Indian territory" and for other purposes, approved April 28, 1904, it is ordered:

Will Have Three Terms Each.

That there shall be three terms of court each year at the following places in the said Southern district: Marietta, Tishomingo and Ardmore, as provided by law, same beginning as follows:

Marietta—First term, beginning October 2, 1905.

Marietta—Second term, beginning October 12, 1905.

Tishomingo—First term, beginning October 23, 1905.

Tishomingo—Second term, beginning November 13, 1905.

Ardmore—First term, beginning December 4, 1905.

Ardmore—Second term, beginning January 2, 1906.

Third Term.

Marietta—Beginning January 25, 1906.

Tishomingo—Beginning February 12, 1906.

Ardmore—Beginning March 26, 1906.
