PLACED IN JAIL.

W. J. Corley Was Remanded by Com-
missioner Pfeiffer—Brought Here.
Federal officers came in yesterday
with W. J. Corley, who was placed in
jail here, having been remanded by
Commissioner Pfeiffer after being
tried together with A. J. Corley on
the charge of killing Chas. Brown.
The tragedy took place near Pon-
Valley last Sunday a week ago. It is
alleged that Corley shot Brown in self
defense. It is claimed that the de-
fendant went to Brown to see about
a pistol and that trouble ensued. The
result was that Brown was shot and
killed. A. J. Corley, a son of the slay-
er, was discharged by the commis-
sioner. The parties are farmers and are
well known in that section.

Wintry Weather.

From balmy weather with gentle
zephyrs blowing and a temperature of
over 70 degrees to snow clad streets
and winter winds that almost blow a
gale, is the striking contrast in
weather conditions within the past
thirty-six hours in this section. The
phases of Indian Territory weather
are as variegated as the tints of the
autumn leaves and Ardmore at present
is getting its full share of the
variety.

Saturday afternoon the weather had
reached that stage where persons
complained of the heat. A rising tem-
perature gave no indication of the
suddenness of the freaky weather. A
few hours later the town was in the
grasp of a mild blizzard. The weath-
er man predicted fair weather for the
territory today but the seer's judg-
ment was poor.

The storm of last night was the
severest of the season and the entire
section is blanketed in a snowy garb.
To add to the discomfort of people a
strong north wind has almost blown
a gale today, filling the travelers
eyes with snow and making it very
disagreeable.

In some sections of Ardmore huge
banks of snow form a blockade. The
fall was several inches in depth.
