Marshal Porter's Appointment.

United States Marshal Porter sur-
prised the politicians generally when
it was learned that he had selected
several parties to fill or succeed the
office holders in the marshal's office.
Sincerely had his appointment been
announced when the selection of C.
G. McKoin to be chief office deputy
was announced. McKoin is well re-
membered in Ardmore in connec-
tion with the townsite work. He held the
position of chief clerk in the townsite
office here and was regarded as an
efficient man. For some time he has
been in the service of the govern-
ment at Muskogee. He will succeed
Chief Deputy Ed Roberts who, by the
way, has made a splendid official and
his many friends regret to see him
leave the office. Roberts accepted the
position under Colbert after much
persuasion. He gave up a fine insur-
ance business to enter the service of
the government. He soon learned that
a man in this position has much to
contend with. The burdens of po-
litical life have no charms for him
and he will retire at least with the
best wishes of many. It may be said
in passing that the record made by
Marshal Colbert as far as conducting
the office is concerned is splendid.

It is learned that \$5,315 checks
have been issued from the office
amounting to \$652,522.85. This amount
was expended from Feb. 3rd 1902, to
Jan. 1st 1906. The difference between
the marshal's account and the amount
disbursed is less than \$2. Few insti-
tutions throughout the country can
equal this record, and Chief Deputy
Roberts and efficient office force de-
serve credit for the showing that has
been made in the past. Inspector
Ramsey stated that the manner in
which the business had been conduct-
ed was excellent.

The political downfall of Colbert
surprises many who were of the op-
inion that the Rough Rider marshal had
such a pull with the president that
his elimination was ordinarily impos-
sible. In the absence of any explana-
tion why Colbert was turned down it
must be assumed that the president
had ample reasons for his actions.
Perhaps they were the charges that
were filed against him and the presi-
dent grew weary of the fight. Who
can say?

Driving Association's Fund.

A vote as to the disposition of the
fund in the treasury of the 1901 driv-
ing association which has disbanded,
will be taken this week, and all votes
should be polled by Saturday evening.
No provision for the disposition of the
fund has been suggested and the
members are in doubt what to do with
it. It has been suggested that it be
turned over to benevolent work in the
city, which seems to be a popular sug-
gestion. There is quite a sum in the
treasury and it would add greatly in
assisting the benevolently inclined in
their work. A result of the vote will
be learned by Sunday.
