ASSAULT WITH INTENT TO KILL.

Two Negroes Have Fight, Which Comes Near Ending Fatally.

Joe Britton, colored, is lying in the Federal jail charged with assault with intent to kill one I. H. Hill also colored. It seems that the two negroes had a fist fight in a dive Saturday night at which time Hill was whipped and run away from the place. It is said that he started towards his home on East Main street when he left the dive, and had nearly reached there when he was hit in the back of the head with a brick which knocked him to the ground, causing unconsciousness. Britton was arrested by the police yesterday and fined for disturbing the peace. He was later turned over to the Federal authorities who are holding him on the charge of assault to kill. It is said that the two had an old grudge, which originated last summer. Hill is not seriously injured and will recover, although the blow was a hard one. The date of examining trial has not been set.

An Old Resident Suicides.

Advice has reached the city that Henry Jones, an old resident of the Indian Territory, who lives on Washita, near Berwyn, committed suicide Friday afternoon, on his farm. The weapon used was a pocket knife. Jones was not found until late Saturday. He was missed from the house Friday afternoon and when he did not return that night a searching party began hunting for him. His body was found in the brush about three quarters of a mile from the house, with his throat cut. Jones is about fifty years of age and has been a resident of the territory for many years. He is a married man and has a large family. He is well and favorably known in his locality and also in Ardmore. No cause can be assigned for the deed, as his married life was pleasant and his relations with the world at large have been the best. It is said the knife used was one which he had been carrying for some time and was a common pocket knife.
