SANTA FE PUMP STATION.

Destroyed by Fire Yesterday Morning—Loss About \$500.

The Santa Fe pumping station, about a mile north of the city at the railroad lake, was completely destroyed by fire yesterday about noon. The blaze was caused by the smoke stack of the engine getting too hot, which caught the flue of the house. The engineer had gone to dinner when the fire started, and the building had almost completely burned down before the flames were seen by any one. When the fire was discovered it was too late to save the building. The machinery which was in the station was partly saved and it is thought that the pump will be in operation by Monday morning. The loss reached about five hundred dollars. It is thought there is sufficient water in the tank in the city to supply the engines until the pump can be started.

STEWART CASE CONTINUED.

Will Come Up Again on the 5th of July—Testimony Practically All in.

The preliminary hearing of Cal and Ben Stewart, charged with the murder of Dr. Samuel A. Graham at Holders on the sixth of June, which has occupied the past three days in the commissioner's court was continued Saturday afternoon until July 5th, at which time it will again be taken up and the remaining testimony in the case taken. Court was adjourned and the case continued on account of Judge T. N. Hobnett having to go to Marietta to hold commissioner's court Monday, that day being the regular court day. Out of the forty-five witnesses summoned, about twenty-eight have been examined, the others will probably not be used in the case. The defense has several witnesses to take the stand, among whom were J. A. Stalling, who had been summoned by the government, Allison Keller, Ike Lemon, and a man named Ballant. The case, it is thought, can be finished and the evidence all heard in one day's time after it is brought up on the 5th.

OATS BEING MARKETED.

A Number of Wagon Loads Came in Yesterday—Good Price.

Several wagon loads of oats were marketed in the city yesterday, which are practically the first in any great amount which have been marketed so far this season from the local neighborhood. The oats are of an especial brightness and are considered good grain by grain dealers. The entire lot was sold to private feeders, as the price was too high for the grain dealers to handle them. The oats retained at thirty cents per bushel. They are of as good quality as those grown anywhere, but contained a number of small grains which caused them to weigh lighter than the grain shipped here and handled by grain dealers. The price is a good one and enables the farmers to raise more grain and less cotton.
