## LEDBETTER NOMINATED

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY HELD IN DISTRICT 103 YESTERDAY.

More Than 900 Democratic Votes Pollled—Ledbetter's Majority 213. Some Entertaining Work Done. Absolute Harmony Prevails.

Ardmore was in the throes of a Democratic primary election yesterday. The polls opened at 8 o'clock and the voters steadily filed in until 6 o'clock in the evening. The candidates for nomination as delegates to the constitutional convention were W. A. Ledbetter and Byron Drew. Friends of the two became very active and some fine election work was done. Just after dark on the night before the election hundreds of torches were placed along the main thoroughfares. These torches were surrounded by cloth stretched upon a frame and each side of the frame bore inscriptions, such as "Vote for Byron Drew," "Who is the Santa Fe Attorney?" etc. The scenes attracted considerable attention and showed much enterprise by the Drew workers.

There being only two candidates the vote was easily counted last night and at an early hour the following result was announced:

First Ward: Ledbetter 189, Drew 122; Second Ward: Ledbetter 150, Drew 72; Third Ward: Ledbetter 84, Drew 76; Fourth Ward: Ledbetter 124, Drew 64. Total for Ledbetter 557, total for Drew 244; Ledbetter's majority 313.

The band played several selections on the street last night, at 8 o'clock a large number of Democrats led by the band marched to Mr. Ledbetter's home and serenaded him. A large number of men and women in attendance were admitted to the Ledbetter home. Those who worked and labored for Mr. Drew's success were present and showed by their action that absolute harmony prevailed among the Democrats.

The total vote cast in this primary was 801. This was at least 100 votes beyond the number expected by those interested in the outcome. The Democrats did not indulge in loud talking but when the opportunity came they were there to assist their choice. Mr. Drew and during the day that if you were out during the day he would be pleased with the interest taken by the Democrats. This same opinion was shared by many others and the good democrats did their duty well by coming 900 strong.

The primary was not held in conformity with the election laws of Oklahoma and there are now two ways in which Mr. Ledbetter can be declared to be the nominee and his name placed on the ticket on the 6th of November. One is by being nominated in a convention of delegates and the other by petition. A number of the Democrats favor the petition plan and in all probability this method will be adopted.

Booths were built at each of the polling places and the Australian ballot system was employed. This is the first time in the history of the town that this method of voting has been adhered to.

Election day as a whole, was very quiet. No disturbances of any kind marred the quiet of the day and the Democratic party has no claim to answer for on account of the manner in which the election was conducted.

### About Improvement Districts.

There is a great deal of discussion now in regard to the terms under which street improvement districts are allowed by the law, and as many streets are now being organized for this work, it would be well to become familiar with those terms.

With the permission of a majority of the property owners on any street an ordinance may be passed by the city council of any town of 2,000 population or over, forming an improvement district for the purpose of grading, guttering, macadamizing and building of sidewalks. Abutting property may be assessed to pay for this improvement, providing that assessment does not exceed 20 per cent of the appraised valuation of any parcel of abutting property and the required annual payments of said assessment shall not exceed 1 per cent of the appraised valuation. Script or certificates may be issued in payment of said improvement, provided 75 script shall sell for less than par value. Street crossings in each district shall be improved by the city, abutting property being assessed only for work done on its immediate frontage.
