

PRISON FOR HOGE.

Negro who Figured in Hartje Divorce Case Given Six-Year Sentence. Pittsburgh, Dec. 15.—Clifford Hogg, the negro criminal convicted of perjury in connection with the divorce trial made by him before the Hartje divorce trial, was refused a new trial and was today sentenced by Judge Frazer to pay a fine of \$50 and the costs of the court trial and to imprisonment for six years in the western penitentiary.

Almost immediately after the sentence was imposed he was taken to the penitentiary.

Attorneys for Hartje will at once take up the matter of an appeal to the supreme court, which meets here in April. From the decision handed down by Judge Frazer yesterday, in which a divorce was refused Hartje. The application will be based upon the fact that the letters figured in the suit were not proved to be forgeries and therefore must be genuine.

"Well, we'll let that pass"—imperturbably—"but what about your worrying habit? You're nervous and irritable all the time, and what can you do about it?"

"That's the bitter part of it," the first speaker admitted, dejectedly. "Some of the family seems to realize that my whole life is spent in ministering to their caprices. Why Marjorie was actually cross this morning when I insisted upon her taking her rubbers and rubbering to school."

Washington, Dec. 11.—The appeal in the case of Albert T. Patrick, convicted of the murder of William Marsh Rice, and now under sentence of death, was dismissed in the Supreme Court of the United States today on motion of his counsel, Ex-Senator Lindsay.

The proceedings in the court were very brief and consisted of the formal motion, immediately followed by the action of the court.

It is understood the court took this action in order to clear the way for Gov. Higgins of New York to commute Patrick's sentence to life imprisonment.
