New York, April 1.—Fines of \$10, 000 each and forty years in prison at hard labor are the muximum penalties that can be invoked upon James Gorden Bennett, proprietor, and Munly M Gillman, advertising manager of the New York Herald, who pleaded guilty to eight indictments for circulating absecte matter through the mails and upon whom sentence will be pronounce ed tomorrow by Jactice Hough of the United States circuit court. It is considered likely they will escape with heavy fines. The New York Herald Company, as a corporation, was also named as a defendant and will be

The charge grew out of the publication in the Herald for many years of a "red Bight personal column." It was alleged to be the source of many evils and a crusade for its suppression was inaugurated by the Parkhurst society and many prominent members of the city, aided by the Hearst newspapeds. Publication of the offensive personal was discontinued some time ago as a result of the public clamor. On March 5 William Rand, Jr., as coun sel for the Herald corporation and the indicted individuals, pleaded guilty in the United States circuit court to eight charges of sending through the mails to expapers containing ob scene and angrestive advertisements in violation of section 3,893 of the revised statutes of the United States At the request of Attorney Rand sen tence was ampended until tomorrow when the indicted individuals will ap pear before the court in person.

THE GREATEST MASTADON.

Teeth of Pre-Historic Monster Fonus Weigh 50 Pounds ach.

What is perhaps the largest maste don ever uncovered completely in Alaska was unearthed during the past six months at Circle City by Max L. Lohbranner.

The exact location of the mastadon is on Alice creek, a tributary of Mineral creek, which flows into Woodchoper creek. To judge of the other dimensions of the huge monster it must be only said that one tusk of the mammoth which is still intact is more than nine feet eight inches long and has a eircumference of eighteen inches. The laws of the animal still have teeth, four in number, Each of these teeth, which have been taken out and replaced, weigh fifty pounds upless. The other parts of the animal are in a poor state of preservation compared with the tusk, Although the hones have not all been collected, they weigh in the neighborhod of about 1,800 pounds.

THE SUGAR PLUM.

The most ancient kind of enndy is the For Governor: sugar plum. It was the invention of Julius Drugatus, a noted Roman baker and confectioner, who belonged to the family of Fabius. According to the New York Herald, it was in 177 B. C. that he made the great discovery which for twenty centuries has done so much mage to teeth.

These bombons, called dragati, after their inventor (dragoes in French), heir inventor (dragees in French), re-mained the exclusive privilege of the family of Fabius. But at the birth or marriage of one of that family a great distribution of dragati took place as a sign of rejoicing. The custom is still isserved by many of the nobility of

The pastille is of far later origin having been invented and introduced into France by an Italian confectioner the Florentine, John Pastilla, a pro-tege of the Medicis. When Maria de' Medici married Henry IV. of France, Pastilla accompanied his sovereign to the French court, where his bonbons had a tremendous vogue. Everybody were excellent. THE ROMAN ANGARIA.

Ancient Postal System That Came

The carefully organized postal sys tem of today is of course more complete than the angaria of the ancient Romans, yet their mail traveled with onsiderable speed,

The system of angari, or couriers on horseback, was borrowed from the Perslans, who, according to Zenophon, had established it under Cyrus the Elder. For County Surveyor: The Roman adaptation of it was the lest system of transmitting letters For Sheriff, Carter County: among the ancient states.

along the great Roman roads houses were erected at a distance of five or six miles from each other. each of these stations forty horses were constantly kept, and by the help of relays it was easy to travel a hundred miles in a day.

These services were intended for the state only, it being imperative to secure the rapid interchange of official communications. In the time of Julius Caesar the system was so well or-ganized that of two letters the great soldier wrote from Britain to Cicero at Rome the one reached its destination in twenty-six and the other in twenty-eight days.

Private citizens had to trust to the services of slaves, and it is not until the end of the third century that we bear of the establishment of a postal system for private persons by the Em peror Diocletian, but how long this system remained history does not say.

The supply of horses and their maintenance were compulsory, and only the emperor could grant exemption from either. The word angaria therefore came to mean compulsory service in dispatching the royal mail. Scrap Book.
