COURT APPOINTS RECEIVER

J. O. Morse, Manager of Wichita Telephone Company Appointed Receiver for the Uncle Sam Oil Company.

By Associated Press. Topeka, Kas., April 20.—Judge Pollock of the United States district court here today named J. O. Morse, receiver for the Uncle Sam Oil company under the bankruptcy petition filed recently by certain stockholders.

Morse is manager of the telephone company at Wichita and was formerly state railroad commissioner. He promptly furnished bond of \$50,000.

The court also requested that the three stockholders who petitioned for a receiver, furnish bond in \$10,000 to cover any injury to the company, that might arise out of the appointment.

CRIMINAL DOCKET
