Cleveland, Okla., Aug. 13.—An attempt was made last night by unknown parties to assassinate James Berr, assistant city marshal, who several weeks ago captured Frank Bailey, the negro tramp, who was later taken away from Berr by a mob and hanged. Bailey had shot and critically wounded John Kelley, a Katy brakeman. The lynching has caused bad feeling between the whites and blacks in this vicinity, and it is generally believed that this led to the attempt on Berr's life. Berr was shot in the neck, but not seriously, and fell as if dead, thus he believes saving his life. At this season we should eat sparingly and properly. POLITICS IN SULPHUR

REPUBLICANS NOMINATE FULL COUNTY TICKET, PROHIBITIONISTS RUN THINGS.

Sulphur, I. T., Aug. 12.—The republican county convention of Murray county has nominated a full ticket. Seven of the nominees, John W. Sharrock, county judge; H. B. Webster, county clerk; J. Q. Adams, county attorney; O. G. McAdams, district clerk; L. B. Parker, county commissioner and J. L. Campbell, representative, are citizens of Sulphur. The remaining nominees, J. H. Morehead, register of deeds; Dr. W. H. Powell, county treasurer; George Pierce, county commissioner; A. C. Wilson, county superintendent; C. F. Maxey, sheriff; Geo. Thrasher, justice of the peace and Tom Six, constable are from the smaller towns and rural districts. The prohibition faction in the party, being well organized, dominated the convention and secured easily the nominations for the seven Sulphur citizens. There was no open outbreak and wild and defiant oratory as in democratic conventions held heretofore in this city, but there was much silent friction, and no little dissatisfaction. A fine rain which seemed to be general over Murray county fell here this afternoon. The corn, cotton and alfalfa crops in this county are the finest ever grown in the Chickasaw Nation. The enormous crops of fine fruits and vegetables are exciting much interest and causing much comment. The fruit and truck farmers are organizing. A large packery will be put in at Sulphur in time to handle next year's crops. Much of the large fruit acreage in this section will do its first bearing next year, the orchards being young. Col. J. R. Hudson, a noted and wealthy horticulturist from DeQueen, Ark., is in this city visiting the I. C. Renfro Experiment Station and making a study of the possibilities of horticulture in Murray county. His analysis of the soils and what he has seen of bearing orchards and vineyards and growing crops has convinced him that this section of the Chickasaw Nation is the very finest fruit country in all America, or the world for that matter, and that Sulphur will soon become the greatest fruit shipping point in the United States. CRAZED BY HEAT

TEXAS FARMER STARTS FOR LOAD OF WATER FAILS TO RETURN.

Wichita Falls, Tex., Aug. 13.—The body of W. S. George, a farmer, 25 years old, who lived near Thornburg, was found on the banks of the Wichita river this morning. The man's throat had been cut from ear to ear, and his own knife crusted with blood, was lying by his side. He is believed to have been crazed by the intense heat, and to have committed suicide as a result. Last Friday morning George left his home in a wagon to haul a load of water. He did not return and Friday evening fears for him were entertained. Saturday afternoon his team was found near the river, but there was no trace of George. The search was continued, and this morning about 10 o'clock the man's body was found on the banks of the river with his blood stained knife by his side. ADOPT RESOLUTION

NEGROES ENDORSE PROHIBITION AND FRANTZ AND CONDEMN THE CONSTITUTION.

Guthrie, Okla., Aug. 13.—Negro delegates numbering about 300, in attendance at Meridian, Logan county, Saturday, adopted resolutions indorsing prohibition, condemning the proposed constitution and indorsing the candidacy of Gov. Frantz and the election of the entire republican ticket. It is announced that this is only a forerunner of negro conventions in other sections of the new state, all of which will give expression to practically the same sentiments. The movement against the constitution delegates say, involves 48,000 colored voters, who will oppose its ratification at the polls, owing to what they characterize as the partisan race spirit manifested by delegates to the recent constitutional convention. They also contend that should the constitution be adopted and a democratic administration elected, discrimination laws similar to those in southern states will be enacted. The stand for prohibition in the Saturday convention is based upon the color line having been drawn by certain saloons, and in many where negroes are permitted to drink, that they are forced to remove their hats upon entering the door. It was stated in the meeting that such restrictions are not enforced in other business houses generally over Oklahoma. The anti-constitution movement, it is said, will be supported by the Afro-American Protection League, the membership of which is composed of most entirely of negroes of Oklahoma and Indian Territory, and maintained solely for the protection of the negro in his civil and political rights. The organization's records show, it is stated, that there are 48,000 colored voters in the new state.

SNAKES DISSATISFIED

INDIANS WANT RESTRICTIONS REMOVED SO THEY CAN SELL LANDS AND GO TO MEXICO

Ardmore Special. Muskogee, I. T., Aug. 13.—The big chiefs of the Snake Indians are now leading a movement having for its object the removal of the tribe to Mexico, and will attempt to get congress to remove the restrictions preventing them from disposing of their lands. The Snakes complain that the invasion of the white man and the consequent civilization of the territory is not to their liking, and that they desire to move to a place where they can live after the manner of the primitive red man. Two Men Pay \$34.50 Each for Drinking Liquor on Train. Hillsboro, Texas, Aug. 13.—Special Officer J. A. Jones, in the detective service of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway company, arrested two men on a south bound passenger train on the road named, between Fort Worth and here, for violation of the new law which prohibits drinking intoxicating liquors on passenger trains. They were placed in jail here over night and this morning pleaded guilty to the charges, also to drunkenness, and fines were assessed aggregating, together with the costs, \$34.50 for each.
