

POWERS DEMANDS TRIAL

BRANDS INDICTMENT CHARGING SUBORNATION OF PERJURY AS INFAMOUS OUTRAGE.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 2.—Caleb Powers, now in Georgetown (Ky.) jail awaiting his fourth trial for the killing of Gov. Goebel, when told of the charges in the indictment for subornation of perjury by the Franklin county jury, said:

"It is an infamous outrage. The circuit court is now in session at Frankfort and will be until the end of the week. I am ready and demand a trial on these false charges before the circuit court ends this week."

Mrs. Jennie Gentry, who is also indicted, lives with her mother in the Merrick lodge building. She branded as false the statements that she with Powers, Rogerson and Attorney Benton entered into a conspiracy to fasten the killing of Goebel on Henry E. Youtsey. Mrs. Gentry said:

"I wish to denounce as utterly false the statement that I entered into a conspiracy with Caleb Powers, John Rogerson and Attorney Benton to fasten the killing of Senator Goebel on Henry Youtsey. There is just enough truth in the story to give it a semblance of being true, but most of it is false."

THE DALLAS FAIR.

Dallas, Texas, October 3.—"On October 19th the twenty-second annual meet of the State Fair of Texas begins and continues sixteen days" said Captain Sidney Smith, secretary of the State Fair today. "Hon. T. M. Campbell will formally open the Fair at 9 o'clock in the Auditorium. He will be introduced by Mayor Hay of this city and will be responded to by President James Moroney of the Fair Association. It has been promised that every exhibit will be in place and every attraction on the grounds at 9 a. m. on opening day. The number of applicants for stalls, and space for exhibits and attractions exceed all former years by forty per cent. We are spending more money this year for attractions in our Music Hall than ever before, and the program given three times a day, will be well worth the rice of admission to the grounds."

President Moroney Talks.

"The display of dairy products, the bee exhibit, the poultry show, the live stock section and the agricultural

show at the Fair this year will prove to every visitor that Texas not only produces bread and butter, but plenty of the milk and honey and meat and fruit" said President James Moroney. "The display of the products of farm, orchard and garden in our new agricultural building will be conclusive proof of Texas' pre-eminence among the agricultural States of the Union. Every section of Texas will be represented from the rice lands of the Gulf Coast to the wheat fields of the Panhandle. In our live stock department there will be over two thousand head of exhibition horses, jacks, jennets, cattle, sheep and hogs, and one of the

largest poultry shows in the country. Our machinery, implement and vehicle department covers ten acres and not a square foot of this great space is unappropriated. Here will be exhibited farm implements, vehicles of all kinds, wire fence and all the incidentals of modern farm equipment.

Press day.

"Heretofore opening day has been Press Day, but the editors desiring a change this year chose the following Monday, October 21st. Their request was complied with by the Fair Association with the provision that all editors visiting Dallas on Saturday, opening day, will be furnished with badges, on that day which will entitle them with admittance to the grounds and to every attraction of interest. Special programs have been arranged for the first three days of the Fair in honor of the visiting editors.

Amusement Park.

More than one hundred new superb shows will constitute the Amusement Department of the State Fair this year. In addition to the permanent attractions already on the grounds there will be a grand aggregation of the latest and most ingenious attractions gathered from all parts of the world. In this carnival center of the Fair will be Turke, Arabs, Cinghales, Beduins, Igorrotes, Turcomen from the steppes of Asia, and Japanese all wearing their national costumes wherever they go. Among the dominant features will be "Constantinople," an Oriental concession representing an investment of \$50,000; a circus of educated fleas; the Igorrote Villagers Monkey Faced Family, Airship Demonstration, Demarest's Wild West Hippodrome, Ostrich Farm, Hall of Myth, Destruction of San Francisco, Carograph Railway, Shoot the Chutes, Figure Eight, Scenic Railway, the Sibley Gorillas, the McCane Museum, and many other attractions.

OIL WELL STILL UNCONTROLLED.

Gusher in Henrietta Field Still Spouting Stream Hundred Feet High.

Henrietta, Texas, October 2.—Sounding at least a hundred feet into the air and giving forth a roar that may be heard for a great distance, the wild gusher brought in yesterday in the Henrietta oil field is tonight as far from control as it was when it first broke out. Several futile attempts were made during the day to cap the well, but experts say that it is best to let the first enormous force be spent before making further trials, since, according to the opinion expressed, if the well should be capped, the well would blow out the fifteen hundred feet of casing.

Experienced drillers say that this well is the greatest strike ever made in the southwest. Because the cap-rock was only cracked, it is impossible to again place the drills, and the flow of oil and gas continues unchecked.

BRITISH LABOR WAR

SHIPBUILDING CONCERNS DETERMINED TO FIGHT UNION TO A FINISH.

Ardmoreite Special.

London, Oct. 4.—Nearly 50,000 members of the Boilermakers' union will be locked out tomorrow, notices to that effect having been posted by the Shipbuilders' Federation. The men affected are employed principally at the east coast ports, at Barrow and on the Clyde. Some time ago lockout notices were issued because of a number of small strikes in which the men left work without notice and without announcing their grievances. When what is known as the Edinburgh agreement was entered into, these lockout notices were withdrawn. It is alleged by the shipbuilding concerns that the men have failed to live up to the terms agreed upon with their representatives and they are now determined to fight the union to a finish.

The principal grievance of the employers is that the executive committee of the Boilermakers' union has no real power and cannot force the men to observe any agreement which may be adopted.

With the prospective strike of the members of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, which, unless something arises to prevent, will be the most serious ever known in Great Britain, the labor situation in this country is rapidly becoming critical. Organized labor is gaining by leaps and bounds and is rapidly becoming permeated with socialism. The recent bye-elections have shown great gains in the strength of the socialists, and the fond hope that English workmen would never be susceptible to the socialistic arguments that appeal to their continental fellows is likely to be blasted.
