### BRITISH NAVAL INCIDENT

#### MAY LEAD TO RESIGNATION OF COMMANDER OF THE CRUISER SQUADRON.

London, Nov. 10.—The German Imperial yacht Hohenzollern, which is bringing Emperor William and party to visit England, and which was expected to enter Sandown Bay, Isle of Wight, tonight, has been greatly delayed by a heavy fog, and has been obliged to anchor, with the cruiser escorting her, off Solsea Island for the night.

An extraordinary incident has come to light in connection with the visit of Emperor William. It is related that at the conclusion of the recent naval maneuvers the channel fleet and the first cruiser squadron were ordered by the admiralty to repast, etc., in honor of the German emperor. Upon receipt of this order, Sir Percy Scott, commander of the cruiser squadron, sent the following signal to two of his vessels:

"Paint work seems to be more in demand than gunnery, so you had better come in in time to look pretty by the 8th inst."

Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, in a general order to the fleet repeating the instructions to repast, refers to the signal sent out by Sir Percy Scott as "contemptuous in tone and insubordination." He ordered Sir Percy to have it stricken from the official logs.

Sir Percy Scott was summoned aboard Admiral Beresford's flagship last Friday and the admiral's reprimand was read to him. This has created consternation in the fleet, and there is a possibility that it will lead to the resignation of Sir Percy.

At Whitesboro.  
Whitesboro, Texas, Nov. 10.—The first blizzard of the season and the worst for this time of the year in fifteen years is raging at Whitesboro tonight. All day the wind blew strong from the north, increasing by nightfall to the proportions of a gale, and the temperature dropped to 36 degrees.

At Gainesville.  
Gainesville, Texas, Nov. 10.—A cold north wind blew up last night and has been blowing a gale all day. At noon today the thermometer registered 45 degrees, and at 5 o'clock this afternoon a driving sleet and rain is falling. This is the coldest weather of the season up to date.

At Dallas.  
Dallas, Texas, Nov. 10.—A nother nearly full grown, swooped down on Dallas today, causing a sudden and deep drop in the temperature. The thermometer is dry and no ill effects are anticipated from the "baby blizzard."

At Amarillo.  
Amarillo, Texas, Nov. 10.—A norther, accompanied by snow and sleet, swooped down on Amarillo today. Tonight it is cold with no indication of clearing weather.

#### Overcharge on Lumber.

Houston, Tex., Nov. 10.—Representatives of thirty prominent manufacturing saw mill organized Saturday morning. The object is to fight for lower freight rates, against car shortages and hostile legislation. A committee was appointed to secure a charter. The next meeting will be Saturday, November 20.

Subj will probably be at once initiated against railroads to recover a million and a half dollars, alleged as overcharge on lumber rates in the past four years and to abolish the two cent differential to Ohio river points.

A general reduction in wages of saw mill labor from 10 to 20 per cent, and also a reduction of hours will be made throughout Texas.
