**SENSATIONAL DIVORCE SUIT**

**EFFORT MADE TO SET ASIDE DIVORCE DECREE SECURED.**

**PROMINENT STATE CITIZEN**

**W. D. Fossett is Also Suing Miss May Scott of Oklahoma City and T. W. Haas, a Traveling Salesman of Chicago.**

Guthrie, Okla., Feb. 21.—Special—Charges of a most sensational nature are contained in a cross-bill filed today in the Logan county district court by W. D. Fossett, formerly United States marshal and one of the most prominent republican politicians in the state, seeking to set aside the divorce decree secured by his wife, Jesse Jacobson Fossett, formerly of Oklahoma City, and T. W. Haas, a Chicago traveling salesman, for the alienation of his wife's affections.

The Fossetts have been well known figures in Guthrie Society. The young wife and the prematurely aged husband were seen at many social functions and their apparent devotion was accepted as genuine.

When Mrs. Fossett, who is 23 years old, sued her husband for divorce the former marshal made no fight. He even went so far as to pave the way for the success of her suit by suggesting that it be based on the ground that he was too often absent from home.

His discovery of his wife's connections with Haas and the Scott woman is the basis for his counter charges. In his petition he states that Mrs. Fossett is now living with Haas at 320 Nelson avenue, St. Paul. His story of how he was deceived is given in pathetic details. He lavished money on his wife, he asserts, denying her nothing. When she was in Chicago visiting relatives she entertained Haas and Miss Scott on the money sent her.

He produces letters said to have been written to Mrs. Fossett by Haas, under the pseudonym of "Mike," correspondence came into his hands by mistake.

The former Mrs. Fossett is a strikingly handsome young woman, charming and cultured. She was seventeen years old when married to Fossett.

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 21.—Special—Salvation Army officers of high rank from every city of the south, as well as many distinguished visitors from the north and east, have gathered in Atlanta today for the inaugural of the fifth annual congress of the southern division of the army. The meetings will be continued tomorrow and Sunday and will include several public services.

Chief among these services will be two at the Grand Sunday afternoon and evening. On both occasions lectures will be delivered by Colonel A. Gifford, from the national headquarters at New York, and both lectures will be illustrated by stereopticon views and moving pictures. In the afternoon Colonel Gifford, whose force and charm as a speaker is widely known, will have as his subject, "Following the Flags," a picturesque review of the work now being accomplished by the Salvation Army. In the evening he will speak on the theme, "From Bethlehem to Calvary," a story of the life of Christ.

On Sunday morning the officers in attendance will occupy the pulpits of a number of prominent Atlanta churches.

This congress is the most notable meeting the army ever holds in the southern states and it assembles a company of social workers who are unusually distinguished for the zeal and intelligence with which they labor for the betterment of humanity on all sides. Among the noted delegates present are Colonel R. E. Holz, provincial officer from Cleveland, O., who will preside at all the sessions; Colonel and Mrs. A. Gifford, New York City; Major E. In all there will be between 65 and 75 officers present.

**SOLONS WILL BE GUESTS OF OKLAHOMA CITY NEXT WEEK.**

**AFFAIR WILL BE ELABORATE**

**Everything is Hustle and Bustle—Toast Program is Being Prepared.—J. Graves Leeper Will Be Toastmaster—Speeches.**

Guthrie, Ok., Feb. 20.—Oklahoma City's invitation to visit and view the metropolis and partake of a banquet as the guests of the Chamber of Commerce on February 29, was unanimously accepted by the house when it was extended by Representative Jones.

The senate adopted an invitation extended yesterday by Senator Stafford. Apparently all objections to the legislature taking a social junket have been withdrawn and a number of legislators have expressed delight in accepting the invitation personally before the Oklahoma City representative.

The Chamber of Commerce banquet to state officers, members of the two legislative bodies, employes in state offices and the wives of all of them, will be a guest at the most elaborate banquet ever given in Oklahoma City on February 29, according to plans inaugurated last evening when it was learned that the house had accepted the invitation.

The special train, bearing 450 state officials, will leave Guthrie at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The train will stop at the Oklahoma state fair grounds, where an inspection of the big building, the race track and other extensive improvements will be made.

The train will then come to the city and will be met by a reception committee made up of the leading professional and business men of the city. The visitors will be taken over the city in automobiles and at 6:30 o'clock the banquet will be given in the auditorium. It is expected that 60 persons will be present at the banquet.

J. Graves Leeper probably will be toastmaster and speeches will be made by prominent men from different sections of the state.

The special train will return those to Guthrie after the banquet who do not desire to remain over night.
