**SUICIDE PACT
HOME FOR AGED**

DOZEN INMATES OF INSTITUTION INVOLVED IN PLAN.

AGED MAN ENDED LIFE

Bethesda Home, in Which Many Inmates Had Placed Their Savings. Being in Bankruptcy, Become Discouraged.

Chicago, Ill., March 20.—A suicide pact which involved probably a dozen inmates of the Bethesda Home for aged, is believed to have been revealed by the death of John Koch, aged 68, who died yesterday by his own hand.

The supposed motive is bankruptcy of the home, which is a private institution and into which many of the old folks had placed the savings of a life time, expecting to be cared for until death.

As a result of the bankruptcy, the inmates are face to face with destitution. Other suicides are expected to follow.

WANT RESTRICTIONS OFF

CREEK INDIANS HOLD CONVENTION AT CHECOTAH AND ADVISE CONGRESSMEN.

Washington, D. C., March 20.—The Oklahoma congressional delegation in congress was today advised that at a convention of Creek Indians held at Checotah, Okla., yesterday, resolutions were adopted favoring the removal of the restrictions which were put on the alienation of the lands of mixed bloods, and asking for the removal by the secretary of the interior of four Creek delegates sent to Washington, and also their attorney in Washington, who are opposing such a proposition.

WILL SEND MESSAGE

PRESIDENT WILL URGE UPON CONGRESS LEGISLATION ON SHERMAN LAW.

Washington, D. C., March 20.—The president will within a day or two send another message to congress directing the attention of that body to recommendations looking to legislation amendatory to the Sherman anti-trust law, and other topics mentioned in his previous message.

A SUICIDE**

MILWAUKEE MAN KILLS WIFE AND THEN HIMSELF.

INFATUATION FOR WIDOW

Is Attributed for Sensational Killing at Milwaukee Early Today—Man Was Fifty Years of Age, Manager of Spice Mill.

Milwaukee, Wis., Mar. 20.—George Willoughby, manager of a coffee and spice mill here, early today shot and killed his wife at their home. Willoughby then shot himself and is not expected to recover.

Willoughby has confessed that he committed the murder because he was infatuated with a divorced woman, whom he had been supporting for years.

The Willoughby couple had just returned from a church social. Both are prominent church workers and Willoughby taught a Sunday school class.

While the woman was asleep Willoughby chloroformed her and then shot her and himself.

He is fifty years of age.

JAPS INVITE FLEET

MIKADO'S GOVERNMENT TRANSMITS INVITATIONS TO AMERICAN OFFICIALS TODAY.

Washington, D. C., March 20.—The Japanese government has extended an invitation to the American government to have the Atlantic battleship fleet visit any port in Japan on its homeward cruise around the world. The invitation was received at the Japanese embassy yesterday and transmitted to Secretary Root and considered by the president and cabinet today.

Secretary Root will this afternoon accept the Japanese invitation on behalf of the American government.
