W. S. Crockett, formerly deputy clerk of the U. S. court in this city, under the old territorial form, has been appointed as special examiner for the department of justice for the

territory formerly embraced in the district known as the southern district of the Indian Territory.

It is the duty of Mr. Crockett in his new official capacity to investigate all judgments, cases pending and disposed of, that affects the titles to Indian lands.

The object of the government has been to secure for the Indian a fee simple deed to the land and protect it against all incumbrances.

The appointment was made Saturday and became effective at once.

DIVORCE SUIT FILED.

Laura Irene Foshee Sues Jonas Foshee for Divorce.

Laura Irene Foshee, through her attorney, has filed suit for a divorce against her husband, Jonas Foshee. The petition alleges that the couple were married July 22, 1907, in Carter county and lived together as man and wife until March 28, 1908, when plaintiff left defendant. The petition further alleges the reason why plaintiff left the bed and board of defendant, that the defendant was an habitual drunkard and wasted his estate. That defendant refused to care for plaintiff and would not stay in plaintiff's society as a husband should do. That on various occasions defendant would curse and abuse plaintiff and otherwise act in a cruel manner, wherefore plaintiff seeks that the bonds of matrimony be cast asunder. The petition also prays that defendant pay the costs of the suit and a reasonable attorney's fee.

Visiting Attorneys Impressed.

William H. McNeal and John T. Allen, practicing attorneys of Kansas City, passed Sunday in the city, leaving at noon yesterday for their homes. These gentlemen have been visiting a number of cities in Oklahoma and state that Ardmore has made the most favorable impression of any of them. They intend to pay Ardmore another visit before fall as they believe that conditions will be such by that time as will make this a very desirable location for them. Incidentally they called at the Commercial club and secured a quantity of printed matter which they will distribute among friends who are looking for a location in some thriving Oklahoma town.

Formal Transfer Made.

The formal transfer of the stock of the Ardmore Loan and Trust company to the Ardmore First State bank was made today at a meeting of the stockholders of the latter concern. The capital stock was increased from \$25,000 to \$50,000. Dr. B. M. Worham of Austin, Texas, president of both corporations, was here in attendance on the meeting. The fact that the Ardmore Loan and Trust company was reorganized into a state banking institution was exclusively announced in the Ardmoreite of several weeks ago when the first meeting was held.

Indian Makes Bond.

Frank Davis, the Indian, who was arrested a few days ago on the charge of forgery, was given a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace M. F. Whitford and bound over to await the action of the grand jury, the bond being fixed at \$500, which the defendant made.

Plows Up Confederate Badge.

Smithfield, Texas, June 22.—W. P. Smith plowed up what he supposed to be an ancient and therefore probably valuable copper coin recently on a piece of "new-ground." When polished up a bit and a magnifying glass procured it proved to be a Confederate badge, or something of the kind, the words "No Submission to the North" being stamped on the side. It is quite a curiosity, nobody in this neighborhood ever having seen one.

TRADE UNIONISTS DEMANDS

UPON THE CANDIDATES OFFERED TO WRITE THE NEW CHARTER FOR ARDMORE.

Organized labor, through a mass meeting, by resolutions, has made its demands upon the candidates selected to write the charter and the unionists of this city desire that in the new organic law which will give Ardmore a commission form of government.

These resolutions will be presented to the various candidates for inspection and every man will be interrogated as to whether or not that candidate favors the demands made.

A committee consisting of D. N. Ferguson, H. F. Kolb and J. E. Galt, was appointed to submit the resolutions to the candidates.

The resolutions adopted are as follows:

We, the artisans, mechanics and laborers of the city of Ardmore, being aware of the fact that our citizenship is about to write for our city a new charter and feeling that our interest and welfare and that of our families and others is dependent upon us greatly depend upon the principles embodied in said charter. Therefore, in order that we may intelligently exercise our right of suffrage, we respectfully ask that all candidates for election to the board of freeholders to write said charter subscribe to the following provisions:

1st. Government by board of commission to be composed of a mayor and three commissioners, and whose term of office shall not be less than one year. All members of the board shall devote their entire time to the business of the city. Each commissioner shall have charge of a separate department. One of the commissioners shall be a practical engineer, and shall have charge of water works, streets and alleys and building inspection. Any officer may be removed by the system known as the recall.

2nd. That the city retain and reserve the right to enter into or engage in any enterprise or industry, beneficial to its citizenship, regardless of individual interest.

3rd. That all enterprises or industries involving a sum more than five thousand (\$5,000) dollars shall be approved by the people through the principles of the initiative and referendum, with every power warranted by the constitution and laws of the state.

4th. That all rights of suffrage be protected in conformity with the constitution and laws of the state.

5th. All franchises before being granted must be submitted to the people for approval. Non-compliance with franchises for a period of fifteen (15) months will render same null and void.

6th. All work done by or for the city by contract shall be paid for at the prevailing rate of wages, and eight hours shall constitute a day. Penalty for violation as provided by state law.

7th. No person shall be compelled to connect with sewer or waterworks until same has been brought to his curb by the city.

8th. All public utilities shall be controlled by the city.

9th. No children under the age of 14 years shall be allowed to work in factory, mine or workshop in the city of Ardmore.

10th. All children under the age of 14 years and over 6 years will be required to attend the public schools of Ardmore at least three months of each year.

President F. R. Lawhon, of the Trades Council and chairman of the mass meeting named a committee composed of D. N. Ferguson, H. F. Kolb and J. E. Galt to wait on the eight candidates with the above resolutions and ask for signatures there-to.

Another meeting will be held Wednesday night the eve of the election to canvass the situation and see if the candidates have acceded to their request.
