STRAW VOTE TAKEN IN ONE PRECINCT

OUT OF OVER 200 AT GLENN LAST NIGHT BUT THREE VOTED AGAINST IT.

The work of the committee having in charge the education of the farmers in regard to the coming bond issue, which will be held on Tuesday of this week is beginning to show and from many products comes news that many who have been against the issue have seen their mistake and will vote for the bonds.

The other night at Glenn a crowd numbering over 200 turned out to hear several speakers, both local and from this city talk about the bonds and after the speaking was over it was decided to take a straw vote to determine the sentiment of the voters.

Slips were made out and passed around and after the count had been made there were only three out of about 200 votes that showed against the bond issue.

In one or two sections where there are many socialists and a few non-progressive who don't want to be disturbed in their long Rip Van Winkle sleep amid the cowsheds of their fathers, and by the side of gully washed brooks, by the song of the hammer on the new bridges, or the tune of the scraper making good roads.

READY FOR THE JAPANESE TREATY

TAFT AND AMBASSADOR O'BRIEN CONFER ON RELATIONS WITH ORIENT.

NO CITIZENSHIP FOR THE JAPS

Japan, It is Believed, Will Insist on Equal Rights for Immigrants With the Most Favored Nations Which May Be Granted.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 11.—President Taft and Thomas J. O'Brien, United States ambassador at Tokio, had a 2-hour interview at the Taft cottage this afternoon on the treaty relations between this country and Japan. O'Brien, from Tokio, Ambassador O'Brien outlined in detail the attitude in Japan as it appears to him. He reports a very friendly attitude toward the United States on the part of Japan and he brought several messages of a friendly nature from friends of the president who hold high official rank in the Japanese government.

The interview between the president and the ambassador, while of a general nature, had particular reference to the new treaty of commerce and friendship between the two nations, to take effect on the expiration of the present treaty in 1911.

After a brief trip to Europe, Ambassador O'Brien will return to the United States for a final conference with either the president or Secretary Knox before returning to Tokio. Baron Takihira will not return to the United States. The general understanding in diplomatic circles is that he is to be displaced by an absolute stranger to the United States.

This move will be a part of the Oriental diplomacy which aims in this emergency to have a Japanese representative at Washington, who is not only in closest touch with his home government and the spirit of the people of Japan and imbued with the national ambition, but one as well who will not be, by long residence influenced by long standing friendships and who will conduct the negotiations strictly on their merits and with stern regard for the complete rights of Japan.

An intimation has already been received that Japan will insist upon the most favored nation clause in the new treaty and on a liberal interpretation of the clause thereafter. That is to say, Japan will live up to the "gentleman's agreement," entered into between former Ambassador Aoki and Elmer Root, secretary of state, whereby Japan promises to prevent Japanese emigration to the United States as much as possible. But where any Japanese subjects should desire to claim the benefits of American citizenship, Japan will insist under the most favored nation clause on the same rights in this respect for Japanese citizens as are given to the citizens of subjects of France, Germany, Italy, England, etc.

It may be said, however, that there is no belief on the part of the United States that Japan will insist upon this point except for the securing of more favorable consideration as to other details of the proposed convention. It can be stated as a certainty that the United States will never agree to confer citizenship on the Japanese, but, on the other hand, it is altogether probable that president Taft will take some steps to insure to the Japanese the same rights that are granted to other aliens residing within our border. And with this idea in view the president may urge congress in his next annual message to enact such legislation as will place in the hands of the federal executive the means of enforcing the treaty rights of such aliens in the courts of the federal government.

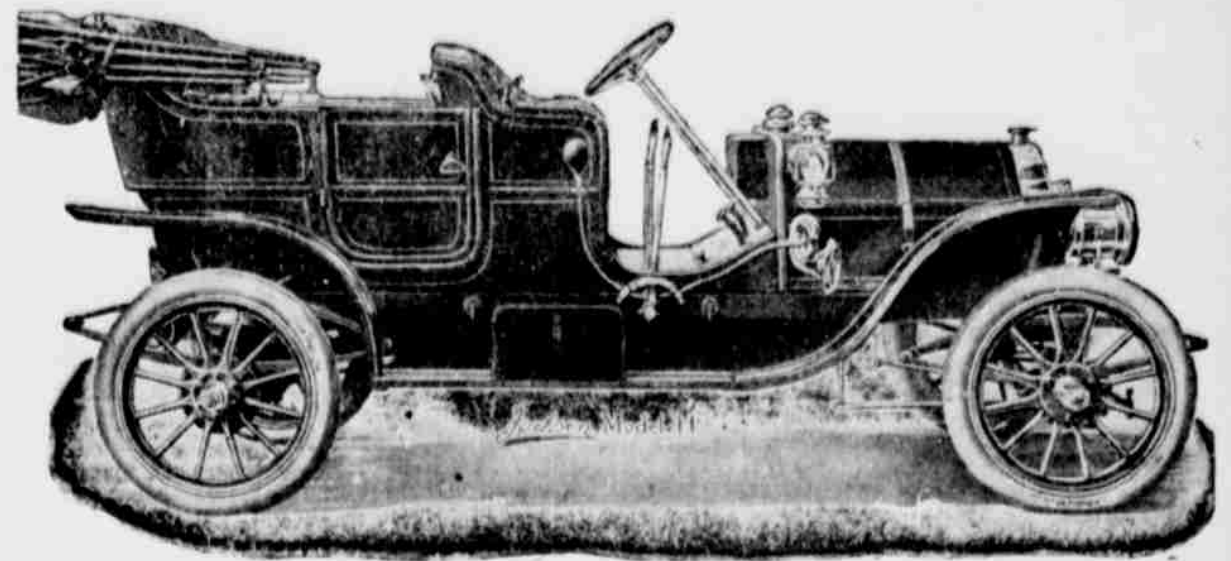
