The most fanatic opponent of capital punishment would most surely agree to and enforce its decrees upon those who traffic in women's bodies."

## RECEIPTS FOR CITY ARE PLEASING

WATER AND SEWER COLLECTIONS MAKE GOOD SHOWING WITH FORMER REVENUES.

Mr. Moore was who fell from grace during the month of October past, if the records of the police court are to be used as a criterion. In the monthly report submitted by Judge Galt to the Board of Commissioners, an increase of \$172 in the receipts is to be noted. During October the report shows that the cash fines collected amounted to \$634 as against \$462 for the month of September. This report does not include the number of men who were unable to pay fines, but served out their sentence on the chain gang under the supervision of M. Moore. It will also be noted at tonight's meeting that the amount of revenue that is being derived from water and sewer is greater than ever before.

During the month past, water and sewer collections totalled \$2,553.15 as against \$1,297.46 for the month of September preceding. The amount of water revenue collected during October amounted to \$1,739.49 and sewer to \$822.75, while for September the water revenue amounted to \$1,675.71 and sewer revenue to \$121.75. Practically all water consumers are on a meter basis, and instead of collecting by the quarter as heretofore on a flat basis, the city is installing meters.

When compared with the receipts of July, when water revenue was collected on a flat basis of so much per quarter, the monthly revenue under the meter system is almost as large. In July the water and sewer revenue amounted to \$2,721.13, but little more than the monthly collection for October.

The sheriff hopes, however, to catch him again before the term of the criminal court begins.

## JUDGE BYNUM IN DISTRICT COURT

IS AT ONCE CONVINCED THAT ARDMORE IS BUSY CITY—JURY WANTED OFF DUTY.

District court convened here this morning with Judge W. L. Bynum of Sapulpa on the bench. The judge presided over the cases last evening and was at chambers sometime in the forenoon for court in connection. Judges commenced for the town square into chambers with a regularity that made the judge sit up and take notice. Almost every juror wanted off the bench. The judge remarked that he had never heard Ardmore was a busy town and he was thoroughly convinced that that fact since it seemed that the jury had time to give to jury service. When court convened the business of the venire at Ardmore was called. All the two who had been summoned answered to their names. Some were excused on good cause and others were retained where they presided such of business as the jury desired. Although one or two whom the judge could not be seated from their places at business were excused.

Judge Bynum presides the faculty of prosecuting cases and allows to a remarkable degree. Those whom he had seen for only a moment in chambers were remembered in the court room and their names and initials were called by the judge with a regularity and correctness that attracted the attention of those who witnessed it.

Judge Bynum comes from a section of the state that is largely rural and he has been elected to the district court.

He holds the reputation of being among the most active judges in the state in executing justice. A few days when his pocket was crowded by his night session for thirty days in an evening.

Immediately after convening court yesterday morning, the trial of the case of J. T. Orr vs. the City of Ardmore, damages was commenced. This is one of a series of three cases against the city for damages flowing out of the overflow of water on Caddo street several years ago. The plaintiff in his case is demanding \$4,000 damages as a result of the flood.

The plaintiff charges that when they laid the pavement on Main and Caddo streets, that it did not lay a sufficient quantity of storm-water pipe to care for the water. That all of the surplus water on Main street washed down on Caddo and did irreparable damage to the buildings and stocks of goods on that thoroughfare so that property owners cannot find suitable tenants.
