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BUSINESS IN THE DISTRICT COURT

WAS A PROMISCUOUS NATURE YESTERDAY—TWO DIVORCE SUITS.

Two divorce suits, one suit for cancellation of deed, and a foreclosure of a mortgage secured by a note were filed in the district court, yesterday.

In the divorce suit filed by Lulu R. Cropper vs. W. E. Cropper, the petition alleges that the couple were married in this city August 22, 1894, and lived together as man and wife until November 1, 1908, when they separated, but lived in the same house, but not as man and wife.

In the other divorce suit filed that of Cordia Bradley vs. G. A. Bradley, entirely is the charge against the husband. This couple were married in Sherman, Texas, in July, 1900, and lived together as man and wife until July, 1909, when further living together with the husband became an impossibility because of the cruel and oppressive treatment.

In his suit for the cancellation of a deed to property in this county filed by T. B. Barthe against W. W. Sullivan, fraud is alleged.

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LEARN FROM JAPAN MR. KNOX SAYS

ORIENTAL KINGDOM HAS MUCH TO TEACH WESTERNERS—COMMISSIONERS REQUESTED.

Washington, Nov. 6.—Addressing a hearing on the ties which unite the Japanese and American nations, the wonderful understanding between the two, characterized the banquet given tonight by the staff of the Japanese embassy to the visiting Japanese commissioners of commerce.

In honor of the visitors the decorations were largely of chrysanthemums of various colors, while the national colors of Japan were entwined with those of America. Toasts were drunk to the president of the United States and to the emperor of Japan.

The secretary of State, Philander Knox, in proposing the toast to the mikado, remarked that it was most appropriate on this anniversary of the emperor's birth and in the distinguished company of Japanese present.

Especially appreciative of the treatment that had been accorded his countrymen was Baron Shibusawa. Life to them had been perceptibly broadened by their visit to the United States, he said.

"This is an opportunity of which I gladly avail to speak of the ties which have contributed to unite our two nations in unity and essential harmony ever since the days when to American representatives first of all you opened your doors for the reciprocal exchange of good will and civilization and trade."

Mr. Knox said: "We have learned from you as you from us. We admire you for all of your national gifts and virtues and not the least for those qualities in which you differ from us. For the eminent qualities drawn from a long and glorious past through which you must teach and we must learn."

During the past week of all the liquor cases tried in the county court only two were convicted, Bob Terrell, on the charge of having in his possession intoxicating liquor, and John Nelson, charged with a similar offense.

In a majority of the cases, the officers failed to make out a case, and the county attorney was compelled in several instances to take the case out of the jury's hands for lack of evidence, or the verdict of not guilty was returned.

Yesterday the jury returned a verdict of guilty against Bob Terrell and a sentence of \$100 and 60 days in jail was imposed.

In the Nelson case the usual fine of \$50 and thirty days in jail.

In the case against Fred Winans, charged with transporting whisky, the jury rendered a verdict of not guilty.

L. O. Bills, charged with having in his possession intoxicants with intent to sell, was dismissed for lack of evidence after trial was commenced.
