Director of Public Safety Says National Guard Won't Be Called For Until Every Power at His Command is Exhausted.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 1.—The street car company determined to show its ability to operate its lines, the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Co. today began increased the number of cars in operation.

The company declared that so long as the situation remained quiet, it would not consider the demands of the labor leaders and the city administration to suspend their lines for a demonstration. The director of public safety said: "We don't want to call for national guards until we have exhausted every power at our disposal."

PINCHOT GIVES THE COMMITTEE SURPRISE

CHARGES AGAINST SECRETARY BALLINGER NOT BASED UPON HIS OWN LETTERS TO HIM.

LETTERS OF LAW PARTNER

Pinchot Says That He Bases Charge That Ballinger's Alleged False Statements to President Were on Letters Sent to Lyman Abbott.

Washington, D. C., March 1.—There was a surprising development today when Gifford Pinchot announced to the committee that he based the charge that Secretary Ballinger had been guilty of making statements to the president that were absolutely false on three essential particulars, and on the letters from Ballinger himself, but upon a letter written by J. T. Ronald, a former law partner of Ballinger to Dr. Lyman Abbott.

CONFEDERATE VETERANS.

The following order was read to the veterans at their meeting last Sunday by Comrade Sutherland.

Dallas, Texas, Feb. 22, 1910.
General Order No. 129.

The Lieutenant General command of the Trans-Mississippi Department, U. C. V., announces the death, with great sorrow, of Brigadier General Edward McKenna, Commander of the Choctaw Brigade, of U. C. Veterans, at his home, Poteau, Oklahoma, on the 19th day of February, 1910, surrounded by his friends and old comrades. An orphan boy, at the age of twenty, he joined Carroll's regiment. Afterwards Gordon's regiment of Arkansas Cavalry in October, 1862, and, although wounded, remained with his company and regiment until General Gordon's regiment was surrendered by General E. Kirby Smith in the summer of 1863.

This is not the proper place or time to speak of the many brave deeds of this gallant soldier, as his history is well known to the men of Gordon's Arkansas regiment. The Division Commander of Arkansas and Oklahoma will take the necessary steps to honor the memory of this brave Confederate soldier.
