BEGIN THE TRIAL OF TSCHAIKOVSKY

ALLEGED REVOLUTIONIST AND
MME. CATHERINE BRESHKOV-
SKY ON TRIAL IN RUSSIA.

AMERICAN WITNESS ABSENT

Indictment Charges That Tschai-
kovsky Visited America in Nineteen
and Six and Seven to Arrange for
Arms for Revolutionists.

St. Petersburg, March 8.—Nicholas
Tschaikovsky and Mme. Catherine
Breshkovsky, who are charged with
being members of the revolutionary
organization and with having partici-
pated in plots against the life of
the czar and high Russian officials,
were placed on trial today. The court
officials have issued tickets as the
court room is very small.

The joint indictment found against
Tschaikovsky and Mme. Breshkovsky
constitutes a document of fifty-eight
pages. It describes the careers of
the two defendants up to 1905, charging
membership in the central revolu-
tionary committee and citing ar-
ticles showing that they advocated
terrorism. A series of depositions of
witnesses, mostly renegade revolution-
ists, is also submitted. They have
to do with the alleged presence of
the accused as delegates to the con-
ferences of the central revolutionary
committee in Finland, St. Petersburg
and the provinces, in which plans
for armed uprisings were discussed.

Tschaikovsky is quoted as making
speeches in favor of the crime of
regicide, and Mme. Breshkovsky as
advocating participation in the prepara-
tions for the assassination of Von
Plebe, Grand Duke Sergius and Con-
stantine Pobiedonostoff, procurator
general of the Holy Synod. The in-
dictment separately charges Tschai-
kovsky with visiting the United States
in 1906-07 to arrange for the ship-
ment of arms to Russia, and to col-
lect funds.

The witnesses admitted include all
those summoned from abroad to es-
tablish an alibi, which is the main
reliance of the defense, and witness-
es who will swear that Tschaikov-
sky was neither the organizer nor a
member of the Peasants' League.

The court also admits the defend-
ant's business correspondence, and various
documents supporting the alibi, but
refuses to accept witnesses to im-
peach the credibility of the govern-
ment's witness, Pateuk, a condemned
revolutionist, who, it is alleged, vol-
unteers testimony at all important
political trials in order to postpone
the execution of his own sentence.

None of the American witnesses,
who include J. B. Reynolds and Le-
bela Barrowa and others who have
testified to the presence of Tschai-
kovsky in America and to the aims
of the Society of the Friends of
Freedom is here. Tschaikovsky will
be forced to rely on the newspapers
and photographs, but several of his
business associates in England will
appear in his behalf.

Madame Breshkovsky's lawyer,
Prince Eristoff, says that his client
will not appear in court. The defense,
while not denying revolutionary ac-
tivity on her part, will merely point
out alleged errors in the indictment
when she is called to plead.

Prince Eristoff's presence will be a
mere formality, as the chief desire
of his client is to avoid anything
that might prejudice Tschaikovsky's
case. The prince will even abstain
from making a speech in court if this
is thought advisable.

Eristoff today said that his client
is in the best of health and cheerful,
though facing the certainty of a long
exile.
