HUFFAKER TRIAL HERE TOMORROW

HUFFAKER CHARGED WITH THE MURDER OF ARBOR GIBSON LAST FRIDAY NIGHT.

The examining trial of J. B. Huffaker, who is charged with the murder of Arbor Gibson at a dance near Baum on the night of March 28, will be heard before County Judge Mason tomorrow at nine o'clock.

Huffaker and Gibson were both killed, were attending a dance at the residence of a man named Haynes near Baum, when the trouble occurred.

In his statement to the newspapers the following day, Huffaker said that he had had trouble with Gibson early in the evening and had left him to avoid any difficulty and that later the trouble was renewed when Gibson was stabbed in the region of the heart. He only lived about seven minutes after he was wounded and it is said made no statement. During the difficulty Huffaker was struck on the side of the head and received a cut on the ear and was also bruised in a number of places on his shoulder and arm. He stated that he was struck a number of times before he drew his knife. He only struck Gibson one time with the knife. Huffaker was arrested immediately after the trouble occurred by Tom Garen, a farmer of that community, who brought him here and turned him over to the sheriff.

Huffaker has employed J. B. Champlin and H. H. Brown of this city to represent him in the trial tomorrow, and states that he has no fear of the final result of the case, as he feels that the trouble was unavoidable on his part and that he was justifiable in doing what he did. The prosecution will be looked after by County Attorney Mathers and Assistant Mathers.

The sheriff spent yesterday in the country around Baum summoning witnesses and it is expected that it will take considerable time to hear the case.

PRES. WILSON SAYS DEMOCRATS WILL WIN

PRINCETON PRESIDENT PREDICTS DOWNFALL OF REPUBLICANS FROM SEAT OF POWER.

New York, March 29.—That the political tide is now turning democratic and the day when the democratic party must take charge of the country's affairs is almost at hand, were declarations made by Woodrow Wilson, president of Princeton University, in a speech at the democratic dinner in Elizabeth, N. J., last night. Mr. Wilson outlined the character of legislation which the democrats should give the country to meet the present economic problems. In this connection he said:

"In the first place we should wish not merely to curb the trusts, and above all we should not wish to regulate them in such a way as will make them either partners or creatures of the government itself. We should wish to square their whole action and responsibility with the general interest regarding them, not as objects in themselves, but merely as conveniences in our economic life and development. Recent proposals of regulation have looked too much like a wholesale invasion by the government itself of the field of business management."

"Our regulations of public interests must be legal regulation and not direct management."

"In the second place, it is clearly our duty to take the government out of the business of patronage, the business of granting favors and privileges, of arranging the laws so that this or that or the other group of men may make very large profits out of their business and draw it back to the function of safeguarding rights, general, not particular rights; the rights which make not so much for the property which enables small groups of individuals to pile up enormous fortunes as for a general stimulation, a universal opportunity for enlightenment and justice. I am thinking of course of tariff legislation."

"Whatever may be our views with regard to the policy vaguely called the policy of protector, it is clear that, in fact, it has long since, as dealt with by congress, ceased to be a policy of protection and become a policy of patronage."

"In the third place it is one of the chief duties of the democratic party to initiate such reforms, alike GAINES—TEN

In local and in federal government, as will secure economy, responsibility, honesty, fidelity.

"In brief, our program should be a general revival of popular politics, of common counsel, of responsible leadership. We must supply efficient leaders and eschew all the lower personal objects of politics."

SEWER SERVICE TO BE FREE OF CHARGE

WATER DEPARTMENT BEING SELF-SUSTAINING PATRONS ARE GIVEN A REDUCTION.

At the meeting of the city council last night an emergency ordinance giving the sewer patrons free sewer service was passed. The councilmembers have been considering this proposition for some time and expected to give free sewer service as soon as the water revenues were sufficient to justify them in doing so in a few months. They expect to reduce the water rates as they part of the city's work and as soon as self-sustaining. Money is being put in for all water consumers as fast as the work can be done. The minimum price for the water has been reduced from \$1.00 per month to 50 cents which was the flat rate and those who use only a small amount of water are not compelled to pay for any more than they use.

The petition from the property owners on Stanley boulevard to have the city control give them six feet on each side of the street was rejected by the council and the work of cutting down the street will begin next week. This will necessitate the moving of some sidewalks and concrete steps that were placed in before the matter was settled.

The bond of J. H. Wyatt, the newly appointed pound keeper, was approved by the council.
