### A DIVORCE NOW CASH FOR ZUFALL

McCLUSKEYS PAY \$4,500 AS BALM AND SUIT FOR DIVORCE IS FILED

Muskogee, Okla., April 21.—The suit brought by John Zufall of Muskogee for \$25,000 damages against C. B. McCluskey, vice president of the Reserve National Bank of Kansas City, S. D. McCluskey of Muskogee, and Adolph Hill of Ardmore, charging the abduction of his wife, and the practical kidnaping of Mrs. Zufall, was settled out of court here today.

Zufall was paid \$1,500 in settlement and the agreement carries with it a proposition that Zufall is to receive a divorce. Zufall evidenced his good faith by filing a suit for divorce this afternoon.

Zufall married Geraldine McCluskey, daughter of C. B. McCluskey, and a niece of the other defendants in the damage suits. The marriage was against the wishes of the McCluskey family and shortly after Mrs. Zufall left her husband. Zufall based his suit for damages on the ground that his wife was practically kidnaped and taken away from him by her relatives.

### TEXAS REPUBLICANS MAY HAVE TICKET

PROHIBITION QUESTION MAY CAUSE POLITICAL UPHEAVAL IN LONE STAR STATE.

San Antonio, Texas, April 22.—In view of the probability that the democratic party may put a prohibitionist on its ticket for governor, the republican executive committee of the state has decided to enter the gubernatorial elections with a full ticket of its own, minus congressional nominations which it has thought best to reserve for the presidential campaign. The platform to be adopted will contain a very strong anti-prohibition plank, a provision which undoubtedly will result in many democrats supporting it. Charles W. Oaden of this city has been mentioned as the man most likely to be nominated for the governorship. Final action is expected within the next few days when both county and state chairmen of the republican executive committee, and several national committeemen will hold a conference with the republican leaders of Texas.

### LARGE COTTON FIRM IS IN BANKRUPTCY

KNIGHT, YANCEY & CO., HAS LIABILITIES OF OVER FOUR MILLION DOLLARS.

Dothan, Ala., April 21.—The cotton firm of Knight, Yancey & Co., one of the largest concerns of the South, having offices in Dothan, Mo., Atlanta, Ga., Birmingham and other cities, went into voluntary bankruptcy Wednesday. Liabilities are said to be in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000. No member of the firm would give out a statement regarding the company's assets, further than to say they are large. The claims against the company are mainly foreign, and it is said no local banks are affected by the failure.

When the announcement of the suspension was made today, a small party resulted in many cities of the south as it was believed many southern and eastern banks had suffered heavily.

W. D. Nesbit of Birmingham, a state railroad commissioner and close friend of Governor Comer, is a member of the firm. He left today for Huntsville to look after the affairs of the company there and to be in touch with the court when the case comes to a hearing. John W. Knight is manager of the Dothan office.

The business of the company has been large, the bulk of it being with European firms. Last year 60,000 bales of cotton were shipped from the Mobile port to Havre alone.

## CHICKASAW, CHOCTAW, CHEROKEE CREEK! LEE CRUCE CAN'T BE BEAT!

There will be more than two thousand school children in the Lee Cruce parade tomorrow. The teachers have notified the children to meet in North Washington street from Main to Broadway, and Commissioner Burnett, chairman of the advertising committee, will have 2000 pennants at the Ardmoreite office for distribution among those who will be in the line of parade. At 10:30 our bands of music will be in line. The merry school children will give their yell for Cruce, and the walk will ring with shouts for Cruce for governor. Mayor James A. Cotner will make the welcome address at the Royal Roller Rink building and this speech will be responded to by a visitor. The speech of the afternoon will be made by Lee Cruce, and all the visitors to the city will be given an opportunity to address the crowds. It is conservatively estimated that five thousand people will be in the auditorium. Chairman Ross has prepared a seating capacity for that many people in the auditorium, and standing room will be at a premium in that vast building, wherever in the state was ever a candidate so solidly supported by his home people as Lee Cruce. In his own portion of the county in the last election there were very few who voted

against him and in the voting election he will be even more solidly supported. The cheering news comes from everywhere over the state that Cruce will be the democratic nominee.

Colonel Sidney Suggs, who has been selected as marshal of the day, was trailing on a fine charger today that he will ride in the parade tomorrow. He was greeted with cheers as he rode up and down the street.
