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MEDIATORS ARE NOW DEADLOCKED

QUESTION OF CONSTITUTIONALISTS' REPRESENTATIVES CAN NOT BE AGREED UPON.

REBELS IN CONTROL

Constitutionalists Say That They Will Be in Complete Control of Mexico Within Two Months and Will Establish a Government.

Niagara Falls, June 2.—The mediation conference is still deadlocked today over the constitutional representation.

The Mexican and American states are considering persons suggested to form a provisional government to succeed Huerta.

Following the constitutionalist statement of last night, the indications today were that nothing definite would be resolved on constitutional representation. The statement criticized the mediators' attitude as asking that the conquered be allowed to dictate terms and pointed out that conquerors don't permit such dictation. The conference today interpreted the statement as showing a lack of information of the negotiations here.

Upon receiving long dispatches from Washington today the Americans requested a conference with the mediators this afternoon.

Cabinet Discusses Question.

Washington, D. C., June 2.—The cabinet this morning discussed with interest Carranza's statement of last night. Although no official account has been received, none would comment as the matter is not before them officially. Immediately after the meeting a communication which is understood to deal with the constitutionalists' participation, was telegraphed to Niagara Falls.

Carranza Scores Mediators.

El Paso, Tex., June 2.—General Carranza issued a semi-official statement from his headquarters at Durango yesterday scoring the action of the mediators at Niagara Falls. The statement was addressed to the press of the United States. In part it was as follows:

"The dominant sentiment of the constitutionalists regarding the proceedings of the mediation commission at Niagara Falls is one of astonishment that there should be such an apparent lack of understanding on the part of that body, not only with regard to conditions in Mexico, but as to the attitude of the constitutionalists regarding the mediators. This lack of understanding is not confined to the commissioners themselves, but seems to be shared by a large portion of the American press, as well as by the government.

"Judging from what has been published from day to day, the mediators appear to consider General Carranza and his followers as a negligible quantity, scarcely worthy of attention, and who, perforce, must agree to whatever conclusion the commission may reach. They do not seem to be aware of the fact that the constitutionalists are conquerors; that they have inaugurated and carried almost to successful completion a revolution, and that this means the establishment of a government entitled to recognition by the rest of the world. Recent successes of the constitutionalist army and others that are imminent are conclusive proof that the power of Huerta is practically ended. His troops will not fight. They either run away or join their opponents with every sign of willingness.

"All that prevents the constitutionalists from entering the City of Mexico today is the physical obstacle of the destruction of the railroads. With communication restored, which is being accomplished with rapidity, the army would be in the City of Mexico in less than a week. Yet the constitutionalist leaders point to the deliberations of the commission and the statements of the press as absolutely ignoring this situation. The peace commission even goes so far

as to propose that the constitutionalists must recognize whatever provisional government they decide to set up and to declare that they must be forced to recognize that government or be crushed."

Mexico City Sees Peace

Mexico City, June 2.—A semi-official note published today says: "We are assured that the peace conferences are on a good road and that our honor and dignity will be saved."

Rebel Ammunition Held Up

New York, June 2.—Five hundred tons of ammunition for the Mexican constitutionalists won't be allowed to leave port here.

Despite the officials' assertion, the steamer will be allowed to leave. No objection was made when sailing time came. The cargo is bound for Tampico, and included an aeroplane.

LEPER FOUND IN MARSHALL'S HOUSE

JOHN EARL FOUND TODAY IN WASHINGTON HOTEL WHERE VICE-PRESIDENT LIVES.

Washington, D. C., June 2.—John R. Early, who has been quarantined in many cities while medical authorities disagreed as to whether or not he is a leper, turned up in Washington today and took quarters at a fashionable hotel where Vice-President Marshall lives.

Early was recognized when he called a reporter to interview him. He was returned to the old isolation quarters amid a panic of the hotel guests.

MEXICAN PORTS OPEN TO COMMERCE

CARRANZA ISSUES ORDER AFFECTING TAMPICO, TUXPAM, AND MATAMOROS.

Durango, June 1.—Gen. Venustiano Carranza today issued a notice declaring Tampico, Tuxpam and Matamoros officially opened to the commerce of the world. He also notified steamship plying to these ports that they must continue arrangements for service made with the Madero government or contracts and concessions granted them will be annulled. These arrangements have been continued under the Huerta government.

The object of Carranza's order was to prevent the companies abandoning regular sailings to these ports, now that they are under constitutional control. Announcement of Gen. Carranza's cabinet and declaration of principles will be made soon at Saltillo.

The organization of a cabinet is taken as an indication that the constitutionalist commander-in-chief believes operations against Huerta are approaching completion.

To Saltillo Soon.

Carranza will go to Saltillo to establish a civil government. His entry into that city will have a sentimental significance to him, as it was there, little more than a year ago, he, as governor of Coahuila, organized the constitutionalist movement.

Telegraphic communication has been resumed direct to Vera Cruz, Monterey, Torreon and Saltillo from Durango.

Gen. Candlío Agallar, recently commanding the forces at Tuxpam, has been named governor of the state of Vera Cruz.

DISSOLVE THREAD TRUST

Federal Court at Trenton Orders Dissolution of American Thread Co.

Washington, D. C., June 2.—The federal court at Trenton, New Jersey, today ordered the dissolution of the alleged thread trust, which was organized under the name of the American Thread Company.

ILLINOIS BANK ROBBED

Citizens of Small Town Watched Work of Robbers who Escaped With Loot

Campaign, Ill., June 2.—Five robbers in automobiles today visited the village of Mahomet. Four stood guard, while the fifth robbed the bank of \$2,500. With the villagers watching terrified, the robbers escaped.

WILL SELL BONDS THIS AFTERNOON

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS WILL DISPOSE OF ENOUGH TO TAKE UP SOME OLD WARRANTS.

The board of county commissioners will sell approximately \$14,000 worth of refunding bonds this afternoon. This is done for the purpose of taking up some of the outstanding indebtedness of the county and to pay bills for material and supplies long past due. There are several sealed bids for the bonds to be opened besides there will be several bidders in the afternoon train to purchase the bonds, if they bid high enough.

There are a great many people who will be glad that the commissioners have decided upon this step as the majority of the warrants unpaid are held by people who could use the money very conveniently instead of letting the county have it.

HOUSE DISCUSSION OF CLAYTON BILL

SECTIONS LEGALIZING PICKETING AND PERSUADING PERSONS TO QUIT WORK.

Washington, D. C., June 2.—The house today discussed sections of the Clayton bill imposing close restrictions on the use of injunctions in labor disputes, especially the sections which legalize picketing and persuading persons to quit work if peacefully done.

The house adopted the section legalizing picketing and other activities without a record vote.

FRANCE TO HONOR TEDDY

Will Be Treated in Paris Like All Former Rulers.

Paris, June 2.—The French government will treat Roosevelt like all former rulers when he passes through France to attend his son's wedding at Madrid. This includes a white pass through all police lines, which is given only to visiting sovereigns.

ELECTION IS VALID

Attorney General Says Local Option Election Within Two Years is Valid

Austin, Tex., June 2.—The attorney general's department held today in an opinion to the county attorney of Angelline county that a local option election held less than two years after a previous election, which was not contested, is valid.

MT. LASSEN HAS DONE NO DAMAGE

FURTHER ACTIVITY OF VOLCANO HOWEVER WOULD ENDANGER MILLIONS OF FEET OF TIMBER

PEACEFUL FOR YEARS

First Outbreak Recorded in California in Seventy Years and First of Importance in More Than Two Hundred Years.

Redding, Calif., June 2.—Thus far Mount Lassen in Shasta County has done no damage in its sudden eruption, beginning yesterday.

Further activity of the old volcano, however will endanger millions of feet of timber. A new crater has opened in the side of the mountain with lateral fissures. Ashes cover the ground for three miles. Large boulders have been ejected from the crater. A cloud of smoke and steam hangs over the mountain.

Word of the eruption was conveyed to this city yesterday in an official report from the Forest Rangers. No great damage is possible, as the country in the vicinity of the ancient volcano is sparsely settled. Mount Lassen is 10,447 feet high and of volcanic origin.

There is evidence that it was in eruption at a comparatively recent period although antedating the entry of the white man into California.

The outbreak is the first recorded in California in seventy years, and the first of any importance in 200 years, although the Lassen volcanic region is at the western edge of a lava field reaching as far as Montana and containing many craters.

W. F. Rushing, forest supervisor at Mineral, is inclined to believe that an active geyser suddenly had developed. He said his subordinates, who reported the eruption, had seen no fire, although the disturbance lasted a whole night. The smoke and steam column, he said, rose about 200 feet.

PLANNING FOR FOURTH OF JULY

MAYOR IS GOING TO TRY TO INDUCE THE CITIZENS TO HAVE BIG PICNIC.

Mayor Roberts stated this morning that he is going to try to induce the citizens of the city to have a big basket picnic and general jollification at the City Park on the Fourth of July. There was a big basket picnic held there last year, which was a great success, and if nothing interferes, the next one will be bigger and better than the first.

Ardmore used to be known far and wide for her big annual picnics, but of late years they have been abandoned. This matter is going to be taken up with the Chamber of Commerce, and it will be seen what will become of it at that time.

Several of the merchants have already stated that that were in for something of the kind, and were willing to help in any way possible to make it a success.

Domingan Rebels Active

Washington, D. C., June 2.—Commander Scott reports that the revolutionists surround Sabo in the republic of San Domingo. The town is expected to fall momentarily. The federals there are isolated from aid. Desultory fighting continues at Puerto Plata.
