THERE IS DANGER.

Jingoism and militarism have nothing upon which to feed in America. There is an absence of the war spirit in this country, but at the same time there are dangers of a more or less serious nature before us.

Our country has been committed to the open-door policy in China, and to the maintenance of China's integrity, and in the face of that Japan had landed a force on Chinese soil and has violated the neutrality of that country.

In Guam and in the Philippines we have responsibilities. There are other features that lead toward the danger line. We have seen the impossibility of living to ourselves, our country is disturbed because our trade relations are disturbed.

But with us peace is honorable, whether China resents or not. In these times, when all Europe is on the verge of war we cannot set ourselves up as an arbiter of nations. We have no lives to sacrifice that we may be a judge among nations.

Some of the great shipping combinations of the world have their fleets made for converting their fleets from coal to oil. The settlement of the European war will be followed by the era of oil fuel on land and sea.

NO GLOOM BRIGADE.

Holland S. Reavis, editor of the Fuel Oil Journal of Houston, Texas, is thankful just as long as we live in a country of peace. He points out, too, that there will be no panic in the oil business and his cheerfulness is refreshing.

"No man who is outside the zone of war should consider himself in hard luck, no matter how tough the business situation may appear to him. Just to be on this side of the Atlantic is all the good fortune a reasonable human should expect.

"If such a thing as a panic in the oil business were possible it would have happened in August. Overproduction of crude, European war, curtailment of runs, all in a bunch.

"But now the tune that is being played by the typewriters and linotypes in the east is changing. There is a cheerful note, where a few weeks ago everything was as dismal as Chopin's funeral march.

"The seas are open to shipping, and while it is true that oil may be regarded as contraband of war, Europe is crying for it, and already there are cargoes on route from this side to supply the demand.

"In the thirty days ending August 25 nine cargoes of oil fuel, destined for the navies of Great Britain, France and Italy were cleared from the docks of the refineries at Port Arthur, Tex.

"Another factor that will eventually benefit the producer of oil, although he may not feel its effects for some months to come, is the increasing consumption of petroleum in various forms in this country.

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NATIONAL CRIME OF FRANCE.

With its national life sacrificed to the god of fashion which has resulted in the establishment of different castes. France today stands as helpless as it did half a century ago when it was forced to meet the emergency that is upon that fair land today.

The nation which shows partiality to its people is planting mines to destroy its national life. Individual citizens of any nation who contribute toward the building up of different castes of society are doing those things which work to the destruction of national patriotism.

The French are deceiving themselves. Their censorship reports defeats as victories, there is a secrecy maintained that dissipates loyalty, soldiers at the front are behind this screen of censorship and but little is known of them until their names appear in the list of casualties.

WOMAN SUICIDES.

Mrs. J. T. Burch of Pauls Valley Ends Life in Fort Worth.

Fort Worth, Tex., Sept. 3.—Mrs. J. T. Burch of Pauls Valley, Okla., was found dead in a room at a hotel here this afternoon. She had apparently been dead since last night.

A note dated Sept. 1 had been left addressed to the hotel. It requested that a sealed letter accompanying it be delivered to her husband, J. T. Burch, at Pauls Valley.

Justice of the Peace R. F. Peden held the inquest and pronounced it a case of self-destruction. The body was removed to Robertson's undertaking establishment to await funeral arrangements.

Mrs. J. T. Burch, the deceased, registered at a hotel here Aug. 30 and was then accompanied by two small children. The address placed on the register was "Pauls Valley, Okla."

Deceased had among her effects a deposit slip showing she had placed \$100 in the Fort Worth National bank early this week. She was about 30 years of age.

WHITE WAY IS THE NEXT MOVE

busy in gathering information from other cities as to what they are paying for electric lights.

The Chamber of Commerce has received a mass of replies from these letters and the mayor likewise has been informed by other cities.

All these communications were addressed to cities with approximately the same population as Ardmore and are not only in this state but in Arkansas and Texas as well.

Last night a committee was appointed to compile this information and make comparisons. They then propose to go before the city council and ask for a copy of the proposed contract between the city and the electric light company.

The proposition for the white way according to the mayor, who has given the matter a pretty thorough investigation, can easily be accomplished without extra cost to the city, provided the property owners along Main street will purchase the ornamental stands for the lights.

It is not the intention of the city to confine the white way to Main street, but will go north and south on Washington and A streets if the property owners will do their parts, making the plan possible.

If this plan is adopted, all overhead lights along the proposed routes will be dispensed with and the city, under the proposed new system, which the electric light company will install, will give the city practically twice as much light as it is getting at present for practically the same money.

The question of road work was then taken up by the Chamber of Commerce, and the secretary reported that the work was getting along nicely and the roads were in very good condition, notwithstanding the recent rains.

A report was submitted by the secretary showing that active work was under way on the road leading to the southeast through Hobbar and Legate and that the farmers in that vicinity had volunteered to build the road into the city.
