OIL and GAS NEWS

Frank L. Hamon of Wilson was an Ardmore visitor today.

Sam Strin of Tulsa and F. G. Janeway of Muskogee are Ardmore visitors.

J. E. Crosbie and M. W. Shriver are here today from Tulsa. They are looking after the Crosbie interests in the field and also after their refinery interests in Ardmore.

A. A. Michaels, who has a contract to drill a well in the northwest of 7-4-3 for the Avis Oil company, will be ready by the first of next week to start the drill. The rig is now under construction.

The pump station of the Gulf Pipe Line company south of Tulsa has been destroyed recently by a lightning stroke, which ignited it. The Gypsy Oil company, which is the producing end of the Gulf now has a 55,000-barrel steel tank on fire in the Cushing field. This blaze was also caused by lightning.

J. W. Harrel, who was in the Healdton field yesterday, was looking at the big oil tank of the Coline company when lightning enveloped it in

a blaze and set it on fire. He said the blaze at first was very small, but it grew quickly until it covered the entire upper surface of the tank. L. W. Burrow, who was some distance away, also saw the stroke which caused the loss.

Healdton Oil company has let a contract for drilling its No. 2 well to Earl Athay and E. N. Dorsey is now building the rig. The well will be located on the north line of the lease and will be in the southwest of the northwest of section 11-4-3. Crittenden Oil company will drill two wells north of the Healdton company's location.

Oil Refinery.

The securing of an oil refinery is being worked out by Secretary Roy Champlin and several citizens in connection with Messrs. Hlyick. The latter want twenty acres of city land and free water. For this they will construct a twenty or thirty thousand-dollar oil refinery and build a pipe line from the oil field to Lawton. The deed to the land to be put in escrow until refinery is in operation.—Lawton Constitution.

East of Ardmore.

The Awitco Oil company which is composed of a number of Ardmore people, has awarded a contract to A. A. Michaels to drill a well east of Ardmore near McMillan, on the line between Marshall and Carter counties, and on the Marshall county side. The location will be in the northwest quarter of section 25, 5s, 3e. Under the terms of the contract Mr. Michael is to furnish the rig, the tools, the fuel, and everything else, and to drill to a depth of 1,500 feet.

John S. Owens is the active spirit behind the company. He secured the acreage and organized the company. A large number of progressive citizens of the town took stock in the company in order to see the test made. Geological reports are favorable. The company took its name from the initials of the Ardmore Western Interurban Railway company, in which Mr. Owens and other parties were at one time interested. Work will begin at once and active drilling should be in progress within three weeks.

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LEGAL NOTICE

Corporation Commission of Oklahoma Order No. 823. Cause No. 2217. Ardmore Oil Producers Association, Complainant.

W. & F. Oil Company, et al., wholly situated, Defendants. APPEARANCES: For the Complainant, Chas. Von Wyke, J. W. Hays, and Wm. Franklin. For the Defendants, W. & F. Oil Company, C. C. Herndon, and C. J. Wright.

THE ORDER: The Commission considers, orders and adjudges that in order to prevent waste and to regulate the taking of oil from the common source of supply, to prevent the inequitable and unfair taking of oil from the common source of supply in the Healdton field, the following rules and regulations are hereby made and established.

(1) The practice, plan or device of placing or holding crude oil in earthen reservoirs, sometimes called pond storage, heretofore in use in the Healdton field is hereby discontinued and prohibited.

(2) The use of wooden or steel storage is permitted under the limitations, restrictions and qualifications hereinafter found. (3) No operator (person, firm or corporation, having the right to drill into and produce oil from the common source of supply) shall take from the potential production of the Healdton field more than his fair and equitable proportion thereof, and in order that the potential production of said field may be determined for the purpose of establishing a basis for the fair and equitable taking of oil from the common source, it is ordered that A. L. Walker, heretofore appointed as agent for the Commission, or his successor in office, make a gauge of each oil well in said field and as its rules and regulations for the taking or making of such gauge, the Commission authorizes its agent to use and uniformly apply the method and plan now recognized and in common use.

(4) That upon ascertaining the potential production of the field, the act of the commission shall thereupon ascertain the transportation or market facilities and ascertain the amount of oil necessary to meet the daily market demands.

(5) That the daily actual production of the oil field shall be restricted and confined to such a quantity as is necessary to supply the probable daily market demand with the exception hereinafter provided that is to say, the raising of the oil from the sand or the production from the common source of supply shall be done by the operators in said field only to the extent of the amount necessary to meet the ascertained daily market demands and under the conditions set forth in the rules and regulations of the commission.

(6) The capacity or potential production of each well in said field shall be ascertained in the manner and by the means above outlined and thereupon the owner in the operation thereof shall be restricted in raising oil from the underground to the surface to the following extent that is to say, the agent of the Commission in said field shall in accordance with these rules ascertain the ratio of the daily market demand to the potential production of the field, and the production shall be limited to the market demand, and in supplying the market demand, the operators shall be permitted to produce ratably, that is to say, only such a per cent. of the possible production of each well as is necessary to make up upon the whole the daily market demand.

(7) In order to guard against unforeseen casualties and contingencies, and to the end that the market may not at any time be deprived of an adequate supply, the use of wooden or steel storage permitted as aforesaid is hereby authorized for the storage of the whole or potential production of any well or number of wells on any one lease or property for a period of ten days, but in running the oil so produced, it shall be run according to the fair and equitable pro-rata of the operator according to the plan hereby established, or in other words, if an operator chooses to accumulate his whole possible production for a period of ten days, then upon the sale of the same he shall be wholly precluded and prohibited from raising any other oil from the sand to the surface until he is due another run upon the pro-rata basis.

(8) The Commission in avoidance of any controversy pertinent to the legal status of common carrier and common purchaser rules, applies the rules and regulations wholly, and therefore both directly and indirectly, to the production of oil and not to the marketing of the same, or rather to the raising of the oil from the sands to the surface, and hereby authorizes its agent in the regulation of fair and equitable production as aforesaid to prohibit the raising of oil from the sands to the surface except such as can be marketed under these rules and regulations.

(9) The storage of oil by any common purchaser or purchasers bought ratably in open market, as here defined, shall be stock under the usual custom of the trade for the purpose of refining or for sale to the consumer is not prohibited by the rules hereinafter prescribed.

(10) These rules shall not be interpreted so as to require the oil to be produced ratably each day, but the amount produced from any one well within a period of thirty days shall not exceed the pro-rata permissible daily production. Cotton Consumption Grows Washington, June 14.—The May cotton consumption exclusive of linters was officially reported today as 493,897 bales, as against 466,744 last year.

Exports including linters were 615,900 bales as against 394,712. Cotton spindles numbered 31,111,137, as against 31,028,336 last year.
