WIRE-DRAG WORK ON THE ATLANTIC COAST

Washington, Sept. 4.—The use of the wire drag has revolutionized hydrographic surveying. It was of course realized long ago that sounding with the lead line no matter how closely the soundings were spaced, was not an infallible means of detecting submerged rocks and boulders and that ledges and shoals of considerable extent might be missed by the lead.

But it was not until the method of dragging was fully developed and systematically applied that it became clearly apparent that a very large number of submerged dangers might exist even in much frequented waters, and remain entirely unknown and unsuspected simply because by fortuitous circumstances no vessel of considerable draft ever happened to pass immediately over them.

It is true that the drag has been successfully used in discovering sand shoals, but it is not so well suited to work over a sandy bottom. Nor in fact is it so necessary that it should be used in such regions.

The work done on the Atlantic coast of the United States is briefly described in a recent publication of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, Department of Commerce, entitled, "Wire-Drags Work on the Atlantic Coast, by N. H. Heck and Jean H. Hawley." (Serial No. 13, Special Publication No. 29, 19 pp. 111.)

This publication gives a summary of the wire-drag work that has been done by the Coast and Geodetic Survey on the Atlantic coast and describes the regions where such work must be done in the future to make navigation absolutely secure. It contains also an analysis of the unit costs of wire-drag work under different conditions and in different localities. Various features of our coast are illustrated and the operation of the drag is shown by diagrams.

No Frank Indictments.

Marietta, Ga., Sept. 4.—The Cobb county grand jury, investigating the lynching of Leo M. Frank near Marietta, reported that:

"We have found several clues, but we have been unable to find anyone who could identify any one party. We have done our best under our oath and we regret to state that we have been unable to find enough evidence to indict any one for this crime."

After it is stated that the grand jury had the active co-operation of Governor Nat E. Harris, the state attorney general, Solicitor Herbert Clay and other officials of Cobb county, the report says:

"We have been unable to connect anybody with the perpetration of this offense, or to identify anyone who was connected with it, although we have investigated the information furnished us by officers and other parties and have followed up letters signed and unsigned, and to this end we have subpoenaed and examined many witnesses in an effort to disclose the perpetrators of this crime, but none of these witnesses could identify any of the parties."

"We find from investigation that officers of the law and the citizens of our town and county knew nothing of this crime until they heard of the body being found near Frey's gin, in this county."

PROF. FRANK READ ACCEPTS FINE POSITION IN DAKOTA

Oklahoma City, Sept. 4.—Prof. Frank Read, Jr., who recently was removed from the superintendency of the Oklahoma school for the deaf at Sulphur, has been appointed to the superintendency of the North Dakota school for the deaf at Devil's Lake, according to advices received in Oklahoma City this morning.

The salary which Prof. Read will receive at his new post is larger than that paid by the Oklahoma institution, and the Devil's Lake school is considered in many respects one of the best institutions for the deaf in the United States.

Superintendent Blattner, the new head of the school at Sulphur, comes from the North Dakota institution. According to a statement recently made by Governor R. L. Williams, he made a telegraphic request that he be relieved of the engagement until after his appointment. Upon the governor's insistence, accompanied by assurances that he would have absolutely a free hand in the conduct of the institution, he finally accepted the Oklahoma appointment.

FOR GOLFERS

On Labor Day there will be played at Farnick Hills a handicap golf tournament of eighteen holes, prizes to be awarded to parties making the three lowest NET scores. In play the rules of the American Golf Association will apply.

The following special rules will obtain for the day:

- 1.—An entrance fee of fifty cents will be charged each person entering the contest.
2.—Play will be open both before and after noon. The score to be posted must be the score made on the first two consecutive rounds of golf played.
3.—The water on the fairway of hole seven and the water in the bunker going to green eight is casual water. Player, when playing into same, will be allowed to drop the ball in some other portion of the hazard or bunker free from water, without penalty.
4.—Handicaps have been prepared by the handicap committee, based upon the scores heretofore made and turned in by players, and are posted in the locker room. Any person desiring to enter the contest, who has not established a handicap, will be given a handicap upon application to the committee.
Special attention is called to the following rules of the game that have not been very generally observed by players in the past, but will be en-

forced on day of this tournament:

If a player play out of bounds, he must play a second ball from the spot where the first ball was played, and suffer a penalty of one stroke.

No player will be allowed to improve his lie. If the ball is in a position where he can not play it, except in water hazard, he must tee his ball and take a penalty of two strokes. If the ball lies in a water hazard, he may drop the ball outside the hazard upon a penalty of one stroke.

Players and visitors are urged to observe the etiquette of the game, and especially to refrain from moving, talking or making any noise in the presence of a player in the act of making a play.
