OIL and GAS NEWS

C. B. Goddard of the Humble Oil company is serving on the petit jury in the district court.

T. J. Dorsett and T. M. Dees of Midlothian, Texas, members of the Thelma Oil and Gas company, were recent visitors to Ardmore.

Dundee Petroleum company will start a well next Thursday to offset the well recently drilled in the north part of section 16-4-3 by Rex Oil company No. 4.

The test which is being drilled at Mineral Wells by the Hivick company for the Ardmore Big Four Oil company has reached a depth of 1200 feet and is full of water.

Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Harker of Wirt are in the city. Mr. Harker is a witness in district court and Mrs. Harker is visiting with her sister, Mrs. Max Bean.

The Oklahoma Star Oil company in the northeast of the southeast of section 16-4-3 started its first well yesterday. The Hivick company has the contract and Joe Hivick is in charge of the drilling.

L. Teatsorth, who has charge of the drilling operations of the Dundee Petroleum company returned yesterday from a business trip to Oklahoma City and left this morning for the fields.

Dundee Petroleum company, Apple-Franklin No. 17 in section 8 reached the sand at 830 feet and is drilling in. It is showing for a good well. Same company No. 4 on the Richards in section 9 was completed at a little over 1100 feet. The production has not been tested. Same company No. 10 in section 5 on the Keck lease is drilling at 450 feet. Drilling operations have begun on No. 16 on the Apple & Franklin lease in section 8.

T. B. Armstrong has arrived in the city from Tulsa and will remain here for some time, representing the Republic Supply company. P. B. Cole, manager of the Republic here, has been crowded with orders and Mr. Armstrong has been detailed to give him such assistance as he needs. Mr. Armstrong was for several months with the Frick-Reid people here, and he knows the producers and is very popular with them. It is probable that he will move his family back to Ardmore.

The Eastern Consolidated Oil company, with headquarters in Dallas, Texas, was represented here today by its vice-president, J. Y. Davis. This company has recently purchased the holdings of the Idaho Oil and Gas company in the Oil City field from Dr. Skillern. The property consists of 160 acres in section 21 and 28 in township 3 and range 2 west. Two wells are now on the property. According to a statement made by Mr. Davis, the company will clean out the two wells and will begin at once to drill ten more.

J. M. Miller, who owns lands in the northwest portion of Carter county, has returned from a visit to Homer. He reports that the shallow well there which was drilled to a depth of 185 feet stands 125 feet in oil and the well drilled near it to a depth of 1300 feet also stands full of oil. The deep well is thought to be filled with oil from the shallow sand. The Homer oil is selling at \$12.50 a barrel to operators of machinery as a lubricating oil. SAFETY FIRST SUGGESTIONS MOST TIMELY

COMMISSIONER LONDON, IN AN INTERVIEW, OFFERS WARNING TO DRIVERS OF VEHICLES TO OBSERVE TRAFFIC LAWS.

The danger of being run down by vehicles in the city becomes greater each day as the number of automobiles in the city increases, and it is a task for the police department to prevent, as far as possible, this evil.

Commissioner London, in discussing the matter this morning, set forth a set of "safety first" regulations that will be of material aid to the officers in solving this perplexing question.

Mr. London said:

"Hardly a day passes that our attention is not called to some accident or casualty resulting in someone being run down or over by a carelessly driven automobile, motorcycle, cab, or even an ordinary hack, wagon or bicycle.

"Ardmore has but recently had ample experience along this line. As the fall season approaches and traffic becomes more dense, this danger to the public safety will be greatly increased.

"Most, if not all, of these accidents could be avoided by the exercise of ordinary precautions on the part of drivers and pedestrians.

"As it would be a physical impossibility to have a traffic officer to guard every street corner and crossing, we must look to the people to co-operate in all measures designed for the public safety.

"The speed limits, as fixed by city ordinance, are 12 miles per hour at street intersections, 12 miles per hour in the business district, and not to exceed 15 miles per hour in the residence district of the city.

"In addition to these requirements, the following suggestions are offered—an observance of which, it is believed, will be helpful to all concerned:

"1. When a fire alarm sounds and fire apparatus approaches, drivers of vehicles of all kinds should move promptly to a position near the right curb, and remain there until all fire apparatus has passed.

"2. Travel as near the right curb as possible, and in turning a corner to the right keep near the curb.

"3. Never turn into a side street without slowing up and sounding an alarm or signal.

"4. Don't sound your horn or warning device in a loud or unusual manner, nor use the same except as a warning of danger. Pronounced use confuses everybody.

"5. Pedestrians have the right of way when crossing the streets on the crosswalks. If injured there the vehicle owner is responsible in damages.

"Vehicles have the right of way between street intersections. Pedestrians should not cross there, and if injured in doing so, cannot recover damages.

"Vehicles of all kinds, including farm wagons, buggies, etc., crossing from one side of the street to the other should do so by turning to the left, so as to go in the same direction as the traffic on each side of the street.

"In turning a corner to the left, go beyond the center of intersection before turning.

"The practice of boys and others riding bicycles and roller skates holding to and being carried along by other vehicles, causes many accidents. Parents and drivers of vehicles should help to prevent this.

Children, as well as inexperienced women, should not be allowed to operate a motor vehicle, especially within the business district of the city. Better practice on some less crowded roadway until they become sure of their ability.

"The confidence which some parents have in the 'superior cleverness' of their children has not in the past prevented the many sad wrecks, cripples and funerals which have resulted from this cause.

"The police will do all within their power to aid in safeguarding the public, but the main burden of responsibility must, after all, rest with and upon an intelligent and loyal public.

"Let 'Safety First' be the motto of every one of us."

COTTON TAKES JUMP OF DOLLAR FIFTY PER BALE

MOST STRIKING ADVANCE IN A YEAR IS NOTED AT LEADING MARKETS — ALL OFFERINGS READILY ABSORBED.

New York, Sept. 13.—Still high prices were reached in the cotton market here Monday, with December delivery selling up to \$10.78, or more than \$1.50 a bale above the closing quotation of Saturday. There was some scattered selling on reports of favorable weather in the south and uneasiness over international politics but all offerings were readily absorbed by a broadening general demand which was doubtless encouraged by bullish private crop advices and reports that spot dealers were paying advances in the interior to secure cotton for early shipment.

New Orleans, La., Sept. 13.—Bullish crop talk sent the price of cotton to new high levels for the season today. The close was at the highest, a net rise of 31 to 37 points, one of the strongest rises of the season. Middling cotton was quoted at 10 cents a pound for the first time in over a year and for the first time since the "buy-a-bale" movement of last season which spread over the country.

The ring was not particularly active and no great excitement was shown, except around the close. Offerings were not liberal at any time and in the afternoon were scanty and a moderate demand served to keep the market at the advance all day. In early trading prices were 8 to 11 points up and at noon they were 17 to 20 up.

At the best the strongest months were nearly \$2 over last week's final quotations.
