"ONE THING THOU LACKEST"

"One thing thou lackest!" Texas with its broad acres of prairie lands, with its fields of rice, with its plantations of cotton, with its majestic cities, with its noble citizenship—yet "one thing thou lackest."

Because it lacks this one thing, crimson blood is dripping tonight from the finger tips of every Texan who takes any prominent place in the making of laws for that state.

We have been taught to trust a Texan anywhere we meet him. Providence gave us the privilege of having first seen the light under the stars that hover over that great commonwealth.

When Indian Territory was a country without a government, when there was nothing here to call forth those inspiring sentiments of love for a country, we have felt like kneeling and implanting a kiss upon the bosom of mother earth when we crossed the state line.

That is love for a state. That is a love that the men in the Alamo felt when there was no messenger of defeat. That is the love that led men to destroy the bridges behind them when the decisive battle was fought with a foreign foe.

But patriotism has been chilled. Texas has done that which belittles it in the eyes of the world and for which it must pay a severe penalty in loss of respect, in loss of love and in loss of patriotism.

Texas hanged a poor old demented man. His head was torn from his body and the blood streams touched the garments of every citizen. A man who had labored through an entire life until he had become gray and feeble.

A man who worked by day and who sat in the peaceful shades of the evening with his pipe and with his family. That kind of man has been sacrificed upon the old law that was torn to shreds in the new dispensation which implanted Christian love upon the earth—that law of an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth.

A man of that kind has been sacrificed in obedience to an old Jewish law that might have been good in its time, but which has been outgrown ever since the Christian era began.

After working for a life time, with hands hardened, with step feeble, with

mfed faded, he was ousted from his place. No sooner would he find work, then he was told he was not wanted. Whether he was right or not, the thought burned into his soul that the man who fired him, haunted him and kept him from working elsewhere.

Anger which feasted upon an aged mind led him to slay the hand that stood between him and his daily bread when he was willing to give honest labor for that bread.

It is not ours to say whether he was right or not, but he believed he was right in reaching that conclusion toward the man who fired him from his job. The practice is called blacklisting, and it is a hideous practice, fraught with the loss of good men.

It is a practice founded upon the wrong principle of "you have done wrong this one time, and there is no forgiveness."

Texas, this one thing thou lackest. While the finger of shame of a great republic is pointed at you, while millions of hearts bleed for the blood you spilled—go and take from your statutes that law which says that men shall be hanged until dead, dead, dead.

Your proud citizenship cannot give life back to the old man. You cannot drive away the tear upon the cheek of a granddaughter, but you can erase that shame by the destruction of the statute which makes such a crime possible.

And then if G. A. Morris would look back and see that erasure as his monument, he would be willing to give the few years allotted to him to correct that crime against the civilization of a state whose grandeur can be measured only by the grandeur of the American republic.
