### NATIONAL DEFENSE AS VIEWED BY BRECKENRIDGE

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—National defense founded upon such a system as the administration's proposed continental army, offers the only possible avenue of escape from compulsory military service for all citizens and its attendant evils, assistant secretary Breckenridge of the war department, declared today, addressing the annual convention here of the national guard association.

"In the last year, said Mr. Breckenridge, 'we have seen all the manifold resources of nations welded into one instrument and subordinated to one will for the waging of war on a scale never before witnessed in history. If the liberties of republics are to be maintained, their military resources must be adequately translated into military strength. For the first time in the history of our country a settled and permanent military policy is proposed for the nation. There are those who say it will not work. The answer is that it will have to work. And, furthermore, that if it will not work, then nothing adequate can be had except under the compelling hand of a militarism that none of us desire to contemplate.

"I say to you that this proposed military policy, imperfect if it be, is the product of earnest patriots on whom our constitution and the laws have placed responsibility for working out just such a scheme. They have done their best. I appeal for your patriotic support, for if this result, which is the product of so much labor, of such infinite consulting and conferences, which has received the imprimatur of the president, of the heads of the legislative military committees, and of the sober opinion of the press of the country, fall of adoption, then we have chaos, inaction and the continuing compromise of the safety of the republic."

In opening his remarks, Secretary Breckenridge read a letter from secretary Garrison, regretting the latter's inability to attend the convention and urging support for the war department's defense plans:

"Those interested in proper military preparation and precaution," the letter said, "have an unprecedented opportunity to accomplish something of incalculable value to the country. We must all lay aside any feeling we may have concerning non-essentials. We must show our disinterested public spirit and our patriotism by getting together on a common ground for a viewpoint, and by rendering mutual assistance for results.

"I stand ready to do this, and I feel an abiding confidence that you also do.

"Being thus actuated by the right spirit and working together to accomplish the right end, we may rest assured that success will be merited and achieved."

Secretary Breckenridge paid high tribute to the spirit that had kept the national guard alive and active and build it up to an organization 125,000 strong, despite public apathy toward the question of military preparedness in days of peace.

"Ever since the Spanish War," he said, "there has been a group of men, unselfish, persistent, energetic, that in season and out of season and always without any great favor, have dinned into the ears of the American public the now apparent need for expansion and improvement of the land forces of the nation. Today, as a national guardsman I proclaim the credit that is due to the guard for nursing and keeping alive in this country an essential and reasonable military spirit and appreciation of the truths of military history when they were most needed."

In outlining the gigantic task of working out an adequate military policy for the nation the speaker said, the Swiss military system was not adaptable to American needs, as the federal government could not control the school system of the country, and the constitution provided for state troops, while the Australian system would have taken too long a time to turn out trained soldiers. Faced with these problems, he added the originators of the policy had fallen back upon what the president had defined as "a citizenry trained and accustomed to arms," and always ready to take the field. This, he said, was the theory upon which was founded the plan to organize a continental army of 400,000 men.

Secretary Breckenridge indicated that a new division of the general staff probably would be created to handle the affairs of the continental army, although many details of its administration would remain under commanders of territorial departments of the regular army. These departments, he said, would be further subdivided which states as a territorial unit of administration and by divisions as tactical units.

### MILLIONS OF POLISH PEOPLE ON VERGE OF STARVATION

Warsaw, Poland, Nov. 14.—Pleading that 3,000,000 persons dependent on the industries of Poland are starving, the workman's union of Poland has sent to the governor general, Herr von Bessler, a memorial urging the reopening of the factories, the adoption of a protective tariff, and the return of machines, mechanical fittings and especially belts and gears, which were taken out of the factories and work shops during the early days of German occupation.

The memorial states that "the working population of Poland includes 350,000 workmen in factories, 60,000 in the building trade and 500,000 in smaller industries." Including the families of these workmen, this industrial population reaches a total of 3,000,000 persons, with a normal income of about \$150,000,000 a year.

A certain proportion of this population, it is stated, has been sent to Germany and another section are receiving aid from their former employers—where the latter are still able to help them. "But there is still a great mass of people who are actually starving," says the memorial, "and for the sake of these persons it is advisable to put at least some of the factories into operation, especially the sugar, vinegar and yeast factories, mills, breweries, sawmills, brick yards and foundries."

### Federal Money for Schools.

Pauls Valley, Okla., Nov. 14.—By the addition of \$6,905 to the county school fund from the federal government, nearly all the rural schools of Garvin county will have an eight months' term for the current year, and extensive iron ore holdings in congress providing this money to take the place of the funds the Indian Territory part of Oklahoma would have provided if Indian schools were taxed. The fund will go to schools that already have a levy of more than 5 mills, and will add such in lengthening the terms to at least eight months.

### INDIAN PRINCESS WITH WILD WEST SHOW

Would you marry an Indian girl if she was pretty, could speak broken English, and was an heiress?

Princess Mary Eagle Feather, a Sioux girl, has all these qualifications, and—she is unmarried! And what is more, she says she will never marry an Indian. Not that she despises her own people. Far from it. She is proud of the Indian as a race, and when she attended the Haskell Indian school at Lawrence, Kansas, and learned to read the white man's books, her favorite literature was that relating to the red men in North America.

But Princess Mary Eagle Feather realizes that the Indian is still in a formative state, as far as civilization is concerned. To marry an Indian would mean living to a degree, performing the hardest kind of manual labor, while the buck took life easy, and being shut out forever from intellectual society.

These views are not shared by her father, the old chief Eagle Feather, who wants his daughter to wed among her own people. Chief Eagle Feather is rich, as Indian riches go. He owns a great deal of good grazing land in South Dakota, has a bank account, which is unusual among the plains Indians, and numbers his ponies by the hundreds.

The present task of the Princess Mary Eagle Feather is to convince her father that a white son-in-law would be more desirable, and the success of her diplomacy would place her in the market for a paleface husband.

Princess Mary Eagle Feather, it is announced, is one of several pretty Indian maidens in the Indian village of Miller Bros. and Artington's 1915 ranch show, and they add greatly to the picturesque character of the big Indian congress. The Indians vie with the cowboys, the cowgirls, the Mexicans and the other strenuous people in giving strenuousness to the performance, and in giving color to the free street parade, which takes place at 10:30 in the morning of the show day in Ardmore, Thursday, November 18.

### GUILTY OF EMBEZZLEMENT

#### Sentence to be Imposed on R. J. Boone at Muskogee is Deferred

Muskogee, Okla., Nov. 13.—Robert J. Boone, formerly an attorney of Muskogee, now practicing in Tulsa, was found guilty by a jury in the district court today of embezzling the sum of \$1,894 from the estate of Edna Glenn, a minor, while Boone was attorney for Robert J. Glenn, the guardian. The jury failed to fix the punishment. Sentence was deferred by Judge De Graf until the close of the present term of court.

This was Boone's third trial on embezzlement charges growing out of guardianship matters. He was convicted a year ago and sentenced to serve one day in state's prison. This case has been appealed. His second trial resulted in a hung jury. There are six more indictments pending.
