REVIVAL SERVICES CLOSED LAST NIGHT

A MOST SUCCESSFUL MEETING TERMINATES WITH MANY ADDITIONS TO THE CHURCH — ORDINANCE OF BAPTISM.

The revival services at the First Christian church came to a close Sunday night. Large congregations attended all the services and at the night meeting the balcony was pressed into service, the large auditorium being filled to its capacity. The evangelist and the singer both left for their homes immediately. The pastor, J. W. Burns, announced to the congregation that the meeting had only begun, and that next Sunday evangelistic services would be conducted at the church, both morning and evening. He invited the people back next Sunday night, to meet a surprise that he said he had in store for them.

Following the sermon Sunday night, the pastor baptized four new converts. During the two weeks the meeting was in progress, twenty-six united with the church, and every department of the church was greatly strengthened. The offerings during the meeting more than paid the expenses of same. The usual services of the church will now be resumed and after the prayer meeting Wednesday night the pastor will baptize all candidates who have not yet been baptized.

The Ladies' Aid society of the church will meet in the church parlors Tuesday afternoon and will have as its guests the ladies of the Presbyterian church.

In his farewell sermon, the evangelist made a strong appeal to men and women to accept Jesus Christ as their Saviour. He pointed out the fact that mere morality will not save one. That God has adopted a plan of redemption and that man must conform to it. He reasoned with men to join the forces that were making possible civilization and enlightenment the world over. That the uplift of mankind can only come through the church of Jesus Christ. That if the churches were taken out of the world, progress of every moral and educational kind would recede. He reasoned that strong men and women of ability and personality were needed to back up such progress. He reiterated his oft-repeated statement that the opportunity for decision to take up the Christian life comes but once in the life of many persons, and if rejected, a serious mistake has been made. He made a strong appeal for manly men in the church.

OF UNALLOTTED LANDS AND SURFACE OF SEGREGATED COAL AND ASPHALT LAND AREA BELONGING TO THE CHOCTAW AND CHICKASAW TRIBES, EASTERN OKLAHOMA, BY THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT.

There will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder at different railroad points in the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations in eastern Oklahoma, from January 3, 1916, to January 31, 1916, inclusive 31,700 acres of unalotted lands and 154,500 acres of the surface of the segregated coal and asphalt lands belonging to the Choctaw and Chickasaw tribes of Indians, at not less than the appraised value. No person can purchase more than 100 acres of agricultural land, nor more than 640 acres of grazing land. Residence on land not required. Bids can be submitted in person or by mail, accompanied by a certified check or bank draft for 25 per cent of the amount of the bid. Terms on sale of surface of coal and asphalt lands: 25 per cent cash, 25 per cent within one year, and balance within two years from date of sale; and terms of sale of unalotted lands: 25 per cent in cash at time of sale and balance in three equal annual installments of 25 per cent each, payable in one, two and three years from date of sale; all deferred payments to draw 5 per cent interest per annum from date of sale.
