VOCATIONAL TRAINING FOR INDIAN SCHOOLS
The committee on course of study for the United States Indian schools recently convened by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Cato Sells, after several weeks' work in conference at Washington, has completed a course of study which will give to the Indians the best vocational training offered by any school system in the United States.
As these schools must train Indian youth of both sexes to assume the duties and responsibilities of self-support and citizenship, this course strongly emphasizes vocational training. It is divided into three divisions. The first is the beginning stage, the second the finding stage and the third the finishing stage. During the first and second periods the training in domestic and industrial activities centers around the conditions essential to the improvement and proper maintenance of the home and farm. The course outline in the pre-vocational division is unique in the fact that in addition to the regular academic subjects, boys are required to take practical courses in farming, gardening, dairying, farm carpentry, farm blacksmithing, farm engineering, farm masonry, farm paint-
