PEACE NOT IN SIGHT

PASSPORTS TO HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE

PASSPORTS TO NEUTRAL COUNTRIES ONLY ISSUED TO MEMBERS OF HENRY FORD'S PEACE VOYAGE.

Washington, Dec. 3.—Henry Ford was today granted a passport for his peace voyage to Europe. One hundred and twenty-five passports have been issued so far and all are to neutral countries. The party will sail tomorrow from New York.

WANT SCHEME SO FARMERS CAN OWN LAND

CONFERENCE ON MARKETING AND FARM CREDIT ASKS APPOINTMENT OF COMMISSION BY CONGRESS.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 3.—The appointment by congress of a commission to devise a scheme whereby farmers can obtain land more easily is asked in a statement issued today by the national conference on marketing and farm credits.

Representatives from forty-six states are participating in the conference. The proposed commission would investigate the results of land settlement in the United States and other countries for material for a new plan of settlement.

Joffre Commander in Chief. Paris, Dec. 3.—General Joffre has been appointed commander in chief of all the French armies, except those in North Africa, including Morocco and dependent ministry colonies. President Poincare signed the decree today.

OFFER STEEL FOR BUILDING DREADNAUGHTS

NAVY DEPARTMENT OFFERED STEEL BY PRIVATE STEEL COMPANIES FOR CONSTRUCTION OF NEW BATTLESHIPS.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The navy department was today offered steel for building the two new dreadnaughts without delay, by private steel companies, which submitted bids for the battleships. The Carnegie Steel company was the lowest bidder.

REPORTED MONASTIR FALLEN

Surrendered to Mixed Force of Germans, Austrians and Bulgars.

London, Dec. 3.—Monastir has fallen, according to an Athens dispatch to the Times.

An Athens dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company dated Thursday night says it is reported in Athens, but not officially confirmed, that Monastir surrendered Wednesday to a joint mission of Germans, Austrians and Bulgarians.
