B. P. O. E. HONOR THEIR DEPARTED

MEMORIAL SERVICE HELD BY ARDMORE LODGE OF ELKS BEAUTIFUL AND SOLEMN. GOOD SIZE ASSEMBLY PRESENT.

"Their faults we write upon the sands, and their virtues upon the tablets of love and memory."

That was the spirit which pervaded the ceremonies held yesterday afternoon at the Elks Home in this city.

Few were the eyes that could repress a nascent tear that welled up with the thought of those departed. But joy came to those same eyes with the strains of "One Sweetly, Solemn Thought."

Rev. Welsh of the Methodist Episcopal church delivered the afternoons address, choosing for his theme the "Providence of our Republic." His address was based upon the two principles which form the foundation of Elksdom,—"Our Flag," and "The Bible," and was a most eloquent oration. Judge Champion's "eulogy" devoted to the memory of the Elks who are "gone but not forgotten," and especially to the memory of W. A. Wimbish, who was the only one whom the Elks laid to his last rest during the past year, was a beautiful tribute to the departed, an expression of appreciation from one man for another, that could not be surpassed.

The musical part of the program included solos by Mrs. N. C. Wood, Mrs. E. E. Guillot and Mr. von Nordheim, and a solo and quartet by Mrs. Burrows, Mrs. Guillot, Mr. Haines and Mr. von Nordheim, all of which were excellently rendered.

Mrs. Frederick Golden-Howes played the violin obligatos beautifully, and Miss Anne Thompson, as accompanist, together with Miss Ernestine Guillot, acquitted herself in her usual artistic manner.

The entire service was under the charge of Mr. Jno. T. Nichols, Past Exalted Ruler.
