LABOR UNIONS DRAW LINE.

Labor Organizations to Insist Upon Use of Union Labor.

(The following is published under authority of the Central Trades Council)

The United Trades Council of this city had labor conditions here well in hand until the city was wrecked by the gasoline explosion in September. The work of rebuilding, since that time, has, however, been so great that the local trade crafts could not handle the work, not even after several of the locals suspended their rules, permitting members to work from 10 to 14 hours per day with the overtime work at the regular day scale. The situation is now somewhat binding upon the property owners who desire their work done by union labor, on account of being unable to get union men in all lines to do their work. This applies chiefly to the electrical workers and the wiring of buildings, which is being delayed in some cases on account of their being an insufficient number of union electricians to handle the work. Kennerly, Spragins & Lewis is the only union electrical contracting firm here now, except the Ardmore Ice, Light & Power company, and the latter does not cater to electrical contracting at all. The electrical workers are authority for the statement that they have used every means possible to line up the other electrical contractors here, but have been unable to do so, and as the various labor crafts of the city refuse to work with non-union men of their own or other trades, several buildings have been tied up delaying their completion. The local trades council desires that the various labor unions over the state know of the conditions existing here and the rebuilding of the city by union workmen can only be accomplished by this becoming known to all. With but few exceptions, the entire city is now being rebuilt by union craftsmen.
