THINKS MANY FIRES COULD BE PREVENTED

BY A CAREFUL INSPECTION OF PROPERTY BY AN INTELLIGENT PLACING OF ALL FLUES AND FIRE PLACES.

Mayor Mullen is of the opinion that a majority of the fires that take place in the city during the course of the year could be prevented if proper precaution was observed, and flues and fireplaces properly installed. Ninety per cent of the fires in the city are among the residences, which are never inspected, while the business houses under the present ordinance are given an examination yearly to see that the provisions of the law are complied with. The mayor stated this morning that he was going to prepare and introduce an ordinance at the next meeting of the Board of City Commissioners creating a committee consisting of the fire chief, the building inspector and two citizens chosen by them to inspect every residence in the city and see that proper precaution was taken to prevent fires.

"If people would take a little pains with their own property and try to prevent fires, they would be calling less frequently for the fire department," said the mayor, "and I believe the plan I have in mind will in a large measure prevent fire loss in the city. At any rate I am going to put it up to the commissioners for their action at the next meeting."

Ardmore has been particularly fortunate during the past year in the matter of fires, but the careless handling of grass fires this fall and the number of petty blazes that could have been avoided prompts the mayor to devise some drastic measure to eliminate danger of a conflagration.
