Will Get Electric Service.

The voters of the city of Caddo decided by the vote of 143 to 23 to grant the Caddo Power company a twenty-five-year franchise for furnishing the people of Caddo and the town of Caddo electrical current for lighting and power purposes, and in so doing they make it possible for themselves to benefit by an electrical service that will rival that of most cities five times as large as Caddo.

W. J. O'Brien, general manager of the Caddo Power company and the Durant Ice and Light company, stated Thursday of this week that this company would run what is known as a high-tension line from Caddo to Durant, whereby current may be transmitted to Caddo directly from the

large dynamos in the local power houses. The investment will require about \$18,000 and work on construction of the line will start as soon as weather conditions will permit. At a rough estimate, there will be probably 175 light customers in Caddo, and the rate will be 15c per kilowatt hour, up to a consumption of 30 kilowatts, with a rate of 10c on all consumption above that amount, and with a ten per cent discount for the prompt payment of bills. There is also a contract with the town of Caddo for current for street lights, the rates varying, dependent on the size of the lamp. The contract calls for a minimum of fifty street lights. When the extension work is completed and all connections made, Caddo will be one of the best lighted towns of its size in the southwest.

Board Considers Waterworks.

The town board of trustees has entered into a contract with the MacIntosh-Walton Engineering company of Oklahoma City to make necessary preliminary surveys and investigations looking to the establishment of a municipal water system. Mr. MacIntosh is here this week going over the ground and investigating several possible sources of water and his engineers will begin their work during the coming week. If the company's plans and estimates are satisfactory the board will call an election to submit the matter of a bond issue. It is impossible, until the cost of construction is ascertained, to tell whether or not the issuance of bonds will be advisable, but the matter will be thoroughly discussed after this information is furnished.

Should an election be called to consider the issuance of bonds, it is probable that the matter of an electric light franchise will be submitted at the same time. The board is favorably inclined toward the proposition submitted by Bert Foster of Ardmore, principal owner of the Ardmore

But the following news item from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram has a tendency to shatter the illusions which have been instilled by The Ardmoreite, and also causes us to wonder how the Carter county elections are managed.

"Ardmore, Okla., Jan. 10.—Municipal night schools, with the object of clearing illiteracy from the county, will be opened this week here, according to the announcement of the local school board.

"There are 1,517 adults in Carter county who cannot read nor write, and of these 607 are voters, according to statistics. Teachers have volunteered their services and the city school houses have been tendered for night schools."

Another Pioneer Passes Away.

The entire citizenship of the town and county was grieved to learn of the death of R. B. Clark, which occurred at the home of Sam House in this city last Saturday morning at 10:15 o'clock.

"Uncle Bobbie," as he was known to intimate friends, had been sick just seven days, and his death was announced before it was generally known that he was in a serious condition. His death was caused from la grippe.

Mr. Clark was born July 12, 1843, in Red River county, Texas, consequently he was 72 years of age last July. He enlisted in the Confederate army and served through the civil war. He was married at Vicksburg, Miss., March 26, 1864, to Mrs. Mattie E. Jones, and their union was blessed with four children, three girls and one boy, the boy dying while quite young. Fatal Accident.

The city was shocked late Monday evening by the intelligence that John, the seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Woods, had been shot. The little fellow lived only a short time.

From what we can gather, the children, after returning from school, were playing with a target rifle that was a Christmas present to Oldham, who is about twelve years old. The gun was loaded and in some manner discharged, the bullet entering near the right eye of his little brother, John, making a fatal wound.

Funeral services were held at the home Tuesday evening at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. H. E. Neighbour. The fifth, fourth, and primary grades of the public school were dismissed and with their teachers attended the funeral.

This is one of the saddest accidents that has ever happened in Madill, and Mr. and Mrs. Woods and children, and especially Oldham, have the heartfelt sympathy of the whole town.

PAULS VALLEY ENTERPRISE.

Shell Davenport Shot.

Late Saturday night at the City Cafe, Zeke Adams shot and seriously wounded Shell Davenport, one of the owners of the cafe. The weapon used was a .38 S. & W. revolver, the bullet passing through the stomach, ranging downward and lodging near the surface in the back.

An operation by Drs. Branum and Johnson, the bullet was removed Sunday and the patient is reported to be resting well and to have a fair chance for recovery.

There seems to have been no excuse for the shooting, it appearing that Adams went into the cafe and started a rough house, striking Vick Davenport under the eye with his gun and when the elder Davenport went around the counter to attempt to quiet the disturbance, stepped back and fired with the above result. Adams was arrested, placed in jail and later released on bond. No preliminary hearing has been held, having been postponed to await the result of the shooting.

Mayor Kendall and city officers have taken steps to rid the city of alleged bootleggers and those who have no visible means of support. Warrants for arrest and subpoenas give evidence of an intention to make Pauls Valley a drier and cleaner city.
