PAVE DOUGLAS BOULEVARD

Property Owners Are Willing if City

Will Pave Intersections.

The city has an excellent opportu-
nity offered it at this time to get a
macadam roadway to the cemetery.
The property owners along Douglas
boulevard, which leads to the ceme-
tery, have expressed a willingness to
pay for the paving in front of their
property if the city will spend enough
money to pave the intersections. The
cost to the entire city will be about
\$5,000, and it is the opinion of a
number of citizens of the town that
the opportunity should be seized and
this work done during the spring
months while the property owners are
willing to stand their part of the ex-
pense.

WOULD SECURE SERVICES OF BANDMASTER

MOVEMENT ON FOOT TO ESTAB-
LISH A MILITARY BAND HERE
THROUGH SECURING SERVICES
OF PROF. MONTIN AS DIRECTOR.

Few people in the city are aware
that there is a movement on foot to
secure the permanent services of Prof.
Montin, director of the Fifth Artillery
Band which is here this week; but
such is the case and the chances are
better than even that he will move to
this city with his family in the near
future, organize a large military band
and open a studio for teaching. Prof.
Montin has spent many years with
the army, he is a finished musician,
having received his training in the
great conservatory at Milan, Italy,
and has his credentials to show for
his effort. He is a teacher of voice as
well as piano, violin, violoncello, and
all band instruments, added to this he
is a competent arranger and is capa-
ble of supplying anything in this line
that he or his pupils require.

His time with the army is practically
finished; of course he can remain until
retired as provided for by act of con-
gress, but he states that he prefers
to retire at this time and settle down
away from barrack life. Prof. Montin
beside his wife has five sons, all mu-
sicians, who would in themselves be
the nucleus of a fine orchestra. He
is infatuated with Ardmore and ex-
pressed a desire to locate here if pos-
sible. The chamber of commerce has
this under advisement at the present
time and as there is a crying need
for a military band here, there is lit-
tle doubt but what the necessary ar-
rangements will be made. Over a
year ago some prominent oil men of
this city stated publicly that they
would become patrons of a good musi-
cal organization in order to have music
on stated nights at the parks of the
city. These men will renew their of-
fer, and there is little doubt but what
the business men backed by the cham-
ber of commerce of the city will do
the rest.

There are few cities the size of Ard-
more in the United States but what
boast of a band. The business men
here have realized for some time the
need of such an institution and seem
prepared to back it.

STATE BOARD PROTECTS FROM IMPURE MILK

IN LESS THAN A YEAR 120,000
MILCH COWS IN OKLAHOMA
HAVE BEEN GIVEN TUBERCULIN
TESTS.

According to a statement recently
made by R. D. McManus who is in
the dairy department of the state
board of agriculture, 120,000 milch
cows have been given the tuberculin
test in Oklahoma since the first day
of last July. The percentage of tu-
berculosis cases has been exceedingly
low, although one herd of nineteen
Jersey milch cows was slaughtered
near the town of Maryetta upon
authority of the state.

Frank Gault, president of the board
of agriculture, is guarding closely in-
terstate shipments of cattle, in order
to prevent the infection of cattle with
this disease. The board requires the
tuberculin test before milch cattle
are shipped into the state and within

120 days after cattle arrive in Okla-
homa, the board requires a second test.
The vigilance of this department is
doing much for the health of live stock
as well as to protect the people of the
state from infection from impure dairy
products.

NEGRO PARDONED, THEN RE-ARRESTED

Little Rock, Ark., April 8.—Frank
Anderson, negro, serving eighteen
years for burglary, convicted at Pine
Bluff, two months ago, was pardoned
Friday by Gov. George W. Hayes and
turned over to Mississippi authorities
who were here with a warrant charg-
ing the negro with murder. In a state-
ment, accompanying the pardon, Gov-
ernor Hayes said that Anderson had
confessed the murder to him person-
ally and that he had no doubt as to
Mississippi's claim on the more serious
charge.

The Mississippi warrant charged
Anderson with killing A. H. Cago, a
Clarksdale banker, last October.

EVIDENCE AGAINST LORIMER NARROWS

Chicago, April 8.—Insufficient evi-
dence of conspiracy to make it proper
for the case to go to the jury has
been presented, Judge Dever ruled Fri-
day, after listening to arguments in
the trial of William Lorimer on
charges growing out of failure of the
LaSalle Street Trust and Savings
bank.

The arguments Friday were on cer-
tain counts of the indictment, one of
which charges conspiracy in twenty-
nine counts. The others charge em-
bezzlement by receiving deposits after

Mr. Lorimer knew the bank was in-
solvent.
