HOME OWNERSHIP LAW IS UP TO FARMERS

CONTINUED FROM PAGE TWO
 public building warrants and bonds, \$289,500; state funding bonds, \$267,500; farm loans, \$4,678,836; on hand, \$437,286.

Investment of Funds.
 A member of the commission recently conceived the idea that the money is piling up too rapidly in the various depository banks of the state at 3 per cent, the low rate of interest which is allowed for such deposits, and asked the attorney general for an opinion as to whether the funds may not be invested in state warrants, public building bonds and like securities. The opinion of the attorney general was that the funds may not be invested in state warrants, but may be invested in public building bonds, as the constitution enumerates state bonds as an approved investment for these funds. There are about \$2,000,000 of public building bonds outstanding. They draw 5 per cent interest. They were issued against the public building lands of the state and are not state bonds, being secured only by the lands upon which they are based.

It is the intention of Governor Williams to oppose investment of any of the school money in such bonds on the ground that it is not justified by the constitution prescribing investments that may be made of such funds. It is not improbable that the opinion of the attorney general will be modified in regard to those bonds being a suitable investment under the constitution. It will be noted that the state has already invested \$289,500 in these securities during a former administration. This investment is doubtless safe, but it is not such, in the opinion of Governor Williams as is prescribed by the constitution.

It is pointed out that the bulk of public building bonds outstanding are held by banks as investment for their capital stock on the theory that such bonds are not taxable. The question of their taxability is now before the supreme court of the state, and if

It shall be decided that they are taxable, as maintained by Governor Williams on the board of equalization, the rule that state school funds may be invested in such bonds, if allowed to stand, would afford the banks now holding the bonds a good market at the hands of the school fund of the state.

Governor Williams' Plan.

The plan of Governor Williams to interest the farmers in the agency of the state through the school funds in aiding them by making cheap loans will be pushed by him at the grass roots. He is confident of the co-operation of the county farm demonstration agents and of the magnificent farm propaganda organization that has its nucleus at the state agricultural and mechanical college. He will devote much of his address to the class on the occasion of the coming commencement day exercises at Stillwater to this agency of the state through its permanent school fund in developing the farms by loaning the public funds at low interest rates.

The fact that the money of the school land office is accumulating much more rapidly than is being loaned on farm security, does not, in the opinion of Governor Williams, justify an effort to make investments of other character. It simply indicates that the efforts to secure the interest of farmers in this source of money must be made to suit the situation. The farmers must be informed. To interest them it is necessary to enlist activities of men not adversely inclined. A local abstractor and farm loan man can not be expected to assist the state in placing 5 per cent money on farm loans when he is loaning at 8 to 10 per cent.

It has been noticed in the past that bankers and other city men who own farms have been getting much of the money the state is placing. They get it for one-half the interest charge that their neighbors, the farmers, have to pay to other parties. They can make money by borrowing it from the state at 5 per cent and lending it to their farmer neighbors at 8 or 9 or 10 per cent. The plan of Governor Williams is to make this sort of thing impossible.

II.
