ZEPPELIN IS DRIVEN ASHORE AND WRECKED

London, May 4.—The Zeppelin L-20 has been completely destroyed and driven ashore on the western side of Hafsø Firth, Norway, according to advices from Stavanger. Some of the crew were rescued.

The Zeppelin L-20 passed north of Sandnes about 10 o'clock in the morning, says a Reuter dispatch from Stavanger. She was flying at a low altitude and was in a damaged condition. Five or six men were seen to jump from the airship. Boats put out to their assistance and the commander and one seaman were rescued and taken to a hospital. The Zeppelin was then driven over

the hilltops against a hillside. Its after-body broke in two and part of it fell to the ground. Some of the crew jumped or were hurled out. The Zeppelin then rose a little and was driven westward but the bag of the dirigible collapsed in the center and the airship descended rapidly. A torpedo boat, which had been following along the coast, went to its assistance and rescued three men still in the cabin. A fourth had jumped out shortly before.

Of the rescued men, three officers and two non-commissioned officers were brought ashore. The whereabouts of the rest of the crew is not known. The Zeppelin was completely destroyed and driven ashore on the western side of the firth, near its outlet to the sea.

INTIMATED THAT BAILEY WILL SUPPORT CULBERSON

Washington, May 4.—Former Senator J. W. Bailey expects to go to Texas soon to make speeches in the campaign and the intimation given in Washington is that he will support Senator Charles A. Culberson for reelection. Whether Bailey proposes to actively take the stump for his former colleague is not known, but his friends say that in making speeches before Texas audiences, the fact as to whom he will support in the senatorial race is certain to develop. With this goes the prediction that a large portion of Senator Bailey's following not already in the Culberson camp will go to him.

Texas in Washington are viewing the senatorial race with no little interest and if the gossip may be relied upon the result is calculated to gauge the future desires of some political aspirants. There is considerable speculation as to the effect the New York letters will have upon the support of former Governor Colquitt and some here are inclined to believe that not a great change will work out. On the other hand, a well known Texan here during the last few days expressed belief that the Colquitt strength will be considerably affected. Members of the house of representatives, some of whom he has served with for fifteen years,

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manifest a keen interest in the success of Robert L. Henry. The discussion revives the story of Senator Bailey becoming a candidate in 1918 against Senator Sheppard but his close friends seem sure in the prediction that he will not seek office. As Washington understands it, Governor Ferguson is the most likely candidate against Senator Sheppard, two years hence when the issue will clearly be drawn on the prohibition question. At the same time, the name of Postmaster General Burleson is associated with the race for governor.

With President Wilson re-elected, Burleson will continue as a member of the cabinet and it is doubtful if he would be willing to leave national affairs before the close of the second Wilson administration.

LORIMER WILL AGAIN SEEK PLACE IN SENATE

Chicago, May 4.—William Lorimer, acquitted last night on charges connected with the failure of his La Salle Street Trust and Savings bank, announced Thursday that he would again be a candidate for the United States senate, from which he was ousted. "In a year," he said, "I expect to have my financial affairs cleared up and then I will be free to resume my political battles." Lorimer declared he will first reimburse the persons who lost their savings through the failure of the bank, of which he was president. "The poorest will be paid back first," said Mr. Lorimer. A federal indictment charging misappropriation of funds on thirty-six counts still is pending against Lorimer, but United States District Attorney Clynne said he would take no action in this matter until next fall. Lorimer's defense was that the crimes with which he was charged were committed by C. R. Munday, first vice-president of the bank, and its actual manager. Munday is now serving a penitentiary term for his activities in the bank.

Along the Mexican Border.

That 1,850 miles of wandering river and straight barbed wire the United States army has been trying these three years and more to patrol with about 19,000 troops; that is, with nearly two-thirds of the entire mobile forces; infantry and field artillery as a rule stationed in large towns, and cavalry sprinkled out in small detachments between. Captain Coates, of the thirteenth cavalry who joined the general staff at Washington only a few weeks prior to the raid, rode the border from Columbus east and west for three years. On dark nights he could not see twenty feet in front of him, and would have to get down and feel for the fence or flash his pocket lantern to make his reckonings. Complete silence made the darkness more baffling. In the deep sand of that country a Mexican pony makes about as much noise as a cat would on a lawn. All you can hear is the sighing of wind moving dimly around, the bark of a dog, or the yap of coyotes; sometimes the murmur of a distant train or the stab of a locomotive whistle. It was the whistle of the night train, they say, which gave the signal in the early morning of March 9 for Villa's men to rush the guard house and begin firing—The World's Work for May.
