city and returned this morning to the field. Mr. Lively is one of the busy contractors at Healdton.

Oklahoma Star Oil company in section 21-13-14, Okmulgee county, is drilling its number nine on the Myrtle Doyle lease.

A. G. Gilger, superintendent of Gunsburg & Forman, was in the city yesterday to meet Geo. A. Forman, who is here from Buffalo, N. Y.

In the southeast extension Gunsburg-Forman No. 6 on the McCoy lease in 22-4-3 offsetting J. L. Hamon is drilling in the sand at 1150 feet.

Oklahoma Star Oil company is putting up a new rig in section 25-3s-1w in Garvin county. The company has large holdings in Garvin and Stephens counties.

The Coombs & Redure well in section 5-7-4, south of Lebanon in Marshall county, is delayed on account of frozen casing. This well has been making very poor progress.

Oklahoma Star Oil company has four wells completed in section 16-4-3 in the Healdton field, and is spudding in number five and has rig up for number six.

The Ardmill Oil company in section 17-5-3 near Oakland in Marshall county, is reported to have a fishing job in the Trinity sand at a depth of 150 feet.

The Tidewater Oil company in the Francis field in Pontotoc county has reached a depth of about 1900 feet and the well is still drilling. A. W. Staiti of San Antonio and Lee Hager of Houston promoted this drilling.

C. H. Everett of the Jones-Everett Machine company's oil field shop, is confined to his home in Ardmore with an abscess on his arm. It may be several days before he will be able to resume his duties in the field.

The production of the Healdton field at this time is conservatively estimated at 65,000 barrels. Some of the men in the field, however, report that the production will reach as high as 80,000, but the former figures are those accepted by the larger producers.

**Echo of the Fire.**  
The Gilmer Oil company's lease was shut down for 15 hours following the big oil fire of Saturday night. The boiling oil running down the creek melted the pump rods on the Gilmer lease, and new rods had to be installed after the fire went down.

Gunsburg-Forman No. 18 on the Westheimer & Daube 60 acres is drilling in the sand at 1,000 feet; No. 25 on the Westheimer & Daube 90 acres is drilling at 250 feet; No. 15 on the Westheimer & Daube 80 acres is drilling in the sand at 1100 feet.

Oklahoma Star Oil company in section 8-2n-1w near Earsboro, is down 800 feet. Hivick & Bane have the contract. This location is between the Maud and Paden oil fields and is regarded by leading geologists as one of the most promising locations in the state.

**Found Gas Sand.**  
The Gypsy Oil company in 13-2-4, west of the Fox district, has reached a depth of 356 feet, and a good showing of gas at this depth is reported. Persons who visited this well say it is making ten million feet of gas which is very unusual for wells of this depth.

Oklahoma Star Oil company in section 4-1-3 near Whitehead is down 790 feet, and the formation looks good. The state geologist, C. W. Shannon, and Mr. Gould, former state geologist, both pronounce this favorable territory.

**In the Fox Pool.**  
The Gypsy well in section 28-2-3 in the Fox district was reported a little too deep Sunday morning. This well has been drilled to a depth of 1550 feet. For the reason that the 5-inch casing will be drawn and the well underreamed to lower the ten-inch casing to the gas sand, it is probably that no interesting reports will come from this well for something like two weeks from this date.

**Geo. A. Forman Here.**  
George A. Forman of Buffalo, N. Y., a member of the well known firm of Gunsburg & Forman, is a visitor to Ardmore. Mr. Forman gave to the Ardmore sufferers on the occasion of the explosion last September his check for \$1,000. He will make only a brief visit to Healdton. Mr. Forman is of the opinion that the 60 per cent runs is only a temporary arrangement and he feels that within a short time the field will be better taken care of than it is at this time.

**Drilling Its Last Well.**  
Lawrence Gas company on the Apple-Franklin-Harrel lease in section 9-4-3 reached the top of the sand at a depth of 830 feet and was completed at a total depth of 1027 feet. The well will make from 75 to 100 barrels. Same company is rigging up on No. 25 and the well will be spudded in today or tomorrow. This is the last well on the lease. The Lawrence Gas company has four steel tanks full and is not building any more storage. It is making runs to the Magnolia line. The company has drilled one well for every four acres.

**Scouting for Roxana.**  
H. O. Tucker, who is scouting for the geological department of the Roxana Petroleum company, has arrived here from the Tulsa office and will be located in Ardmore. He has been employed by the Roxana to keep that company informed on wildcat tests in the southern portion of the state. While the Roxana company has done some wildcatting in the upper fields it has never done any drilling of this character in the southern fields, but the company is aggressive and the chances are that it will become interested in wildcat territory in this portion of the state. Mr. Tucker was a driller in the early days at Healdton, and suffered a broken leg while in the employ of C. M. Hapgood.

**Oil Showing Near Marietta.**  
The Life Stake Petroleum company in section 35-6s-2e in Love county has reached a total depth of 405 feet. At this depth the drill was on top of an oil sand and the hole stands 350 feet in water. The casing will be lowered, the water will be bailed out and the sand will be drilled into. The oil has the appearance of being like Healdton crude in quality, or possibly a little heavier as the shallow oil is usually a heavy oil. This sand also has a showing of gas. Whether this is a pay well or not can only be determined with the drill. This well has had several shallow oil sands on the way down, and it is a good looking wildcat. This location is about 5 miles north of the town of Marietta.

**A Line Fight.**  
The Thelma Oil & Gas company on its 20-acre lease in the northwest quarter of section 8-4-3 is drilling two wells which are located on the east line of this lease and the Twin State Oil company which owns acreage in the east also moved up to the line and began drilling offset wells. These rigs are only about 15 feet apart and it looks like a real line fight is on. This is the only line fight that is now being made at Healdton. The Thelma people probably did this for the reason that its east side is productive of oil, while there is some doubt with reference to the west side. A smaller fight was made in section 33 some months ago when the Harris-Strawn people moved down to the south line of section 33 and drilled some wells that were offset by the Magnolia on the Roy Chilton lease. In the upper fields of the state it is

not unusual to see twin rigs, but line fights in Healdton have been unusual.

**Here From Oklahoma City.**  
Arthur W. Pettit who was in the last state campaign for insurance commissioner, and William Connolly, both of Oklahoma City, are Ardmore visitors. Mr. Connolly is one of the oldest mail clerks in the state. When the first train ran into Oklahoma, Dennis Flynn came into the state with a postoffice commission in his pocket, and Mr. Connolly came on the same train, in the postal service. He is now in the office, and is not making any railway runs.

Mr. Connolly made some purchases of lands in fee in Carter county several years ago, and he has holdings near the well that is ready to start in section 8-2-3 which will be drilled by B. B. Jones, and he also has acreage near the Oklahoma-Louisiana well in section 7-2-2, in the Graham district. Mr. Connolly and Mr. Pettit will spend today in Ardmore and will leave here tomorrow for a trip through the fields.

### CYCLONE DOES DEADLY WORK AT KEMP CITY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 4)

relief work, was rushed to the scene. The train had to creep cautiously at times on account of numerous limbs from trees falling over the track. Arriving in Kemp City, most of the injured had been carried to the houses of T. H. Fowler and J. M. Webb, while the home of Mrs. J. K. McLoughlin was turned into a morgue.

Residents of the little city that was so quickly crushed to earth were cool and collected under the circumstances and directed the rescue party to the different places where help was needed. Families of children were scattered in different places, some mortally wounded, others bleeding, with many cuts over their little bodies, while their parents lay in the improvised hospitals groaning with pain as physicians dressed their numerous wounds.

**Several Fatally Hurt.**  
The injured were placed on the improvised cots made of the few doors that were found on the ground intact. They were carried to the special train and rushed to the Denison hospital for treatment. Late Sunday afternoon all were reported resting well, but it is believed several are fatally injured.

Kemp City was established when the Missouri, Oklahoma & Gulf railroad was constructed into Denison. It is located near the town of Kemp in Bryan county which was at one time a prominent Indian trading point.

**Cotton Gin Goes First.**  
As the town was located in a rich cotton belt, a large gin was erected near the heart of the city this season and this was one of the first buildings destroyed. The following business houses were completely blown away, including buildings and stocks:

Fowler Mercantile company, O. L. Cox, groceries; B. G. Thomas, groceries; Lingo-Leeper Lumber company, two-story frame hotel, empty store building, storeroom for feed stuff, blacksmith shop, livery stable and seven horses, storeroom with 4,000 bushels of corn belonging to Fowler Mercantile company. The school house and all churches were destroyed.

The homes of the following were destroyed completely: Dr. G. H. Ellis, Dr. W. A. Brinson, W. J. Norman, J. W. Hively, O. E. Cox, J. E. Pleasant, W. B. Hill, C. P. Rogers, G. W. Ellis, Mason Mountain, W. H. Webb, Dixie Williams, T. E. Brown and T. F. Meminger. These houses were located in the city. Others in the path of the storm, both in town and in the country were destroyed, but it was impossible in the confusion to get the names of the occupants. The homes of T. H. Fowler, Mrs. J. R. McLoughlin and J. M. Webb, Jr., were damaged considerably, but left standing.

## LOOKS LIKE GREAT BELT OF NATURAL GAS

These two wells, drilling in the same township, are very encouraging to the oil men, and they make the southern fields look like they will be extended until the southern portion of the state will give up as much wealth in oil as the northern portion has ever given up, and the chances are good that as many great fortunes will be made here as have been made in the Tulsa district.
