Ardmore, Oklahoma, May 22, 1916. At a regular meeting of the Ministers' association of the city of Ardmore, Oklahoma, held at 9 a. m. on the 22nd day of May, 1916, the following resolution was made and adopted, by a unanimous vote of the said association:

"Resolved, that we, as ministers of the various churches of the city of Ardmore, Oklahoma, deplore, con-

demn and resent all dancing and connivance at dancing in the public schools of the said city, or in any function held by said schools, either in or out of said schools, by the pupils or school authorities.

"Be it further resolved, that we understand that the Junior and Senior classes of the High school of said city are to have a banquet and dance at the Elks' Hall, in the city of Ardmore, Oklahoma, on the evening of May 23, 1916, which dance, if same is to be had, we especially deplore, condemn and resent.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be published in The Daily Ardmoreite, of Ardmore, Oklahoma, on the 22nd and 23rd days of May, 1916.

**AMATEUR NIGHT AT THE ATHLETIC CLUB**

The Ardmore Athletic Club will have its first amateur show next Friday night and several aspiring young athletes will contest for supremacy upon this occasion. There has been some complaint that the club rooms were not large enough, but Mr. Edwards, the manager, assures the patrons that he can seat more people there than he has ever had present at any of his shows. The present method will seat 350 people handily, but he is going to build circus seats and his seating capacity will almost be doubled.

**RABBI GEORGE FOX**

Delivers Interesting Sermon at the Synagogue Last Night.

The "landless man to the manless land" and the "big brotherhood movement" was the theme of Rabbi George Fox at the meeting of the Jewish congregation at their tabernacle Sunday night. Practically every Jew in the city and many others turned out to hear the eloquent visiting rabbi, who comes here periodically from Fort Worth to hold services, and last night his address was characterized as one of the strongest he had ever made here. The rabbi pointed out that for twenty centuries the Jews had been compelled to have pointed to them the finger of scorn because theirs was a "nation of shop-keepers and vendors." He pointed out how after the destruction of Jerusalem all avenues of trade and the very soil itself had been excluded from his people but that now, in this great land, the hearts of the Jews were turning to the chief pursuit of their ancestors and that thousands would welcome the opportunity of being producers rather than consumers. He told of a movement on foot to make colonies in the southwest, where emigrants could be taken from the ghettos of

the large cities and given land and homes and educational and religious facilities. He asked the support of all to the movement which was fast crystallizing and would unquestionably be worked out in the near future. Of the social service work of the Jew he told many incidents in which young boys had been saved from going to the bad by counsel and help from the "big brother" and urged activity in Ardmore. "And remember," he said, "Jews and Christians are all God's children and God wants us to reach down and lift any of them up without first asking who they are and what they are."
