by the school problem may be a grave one for authorities, but fortunately this situation does not obtain in Oklahoma.

In the first place the total number of cases of infantile paralysis in this state have been small—less than one to every 100,000 population. Furthermore in no section of the state has there been the slightest indication of an epidemic. The cases have been isolated. There would be one in a given county and the next case reported would one hundred or more miles away. The greatest number that has been reported from any given county has been two. It would appear that under normal circumstances the disease is not nearly as infectious as many diseases which cause far less popular concern.

board, with the assistance of local health authorities, has taken precautions to prevent the spread of the disease, should it break out in any given community. As soon as any case is diagnosed as infantile paralysis a report is instantly forwarded to the state health board. Steps are immediately taken to isolate the patient and if necessary the family. Whenever necessary an expert from the state health board is immediately sent to the scene. Not only are the precautions necessary for the immediate protection of the community taken, but a thorough study is made of general sanitary conditions. No measure has been omitted which will protect the health of the people of Oklahoma and prevent the disease from obtaining a foothold in this state.

How Disease is Spread.
Despite careful investigation by many experts there are a number of problems connected with infantile paralysis which factor in the spread of infantile paralysis is the presence of minute organisms in the secretions of the nose and throat. These are the paths of infection both for body and for its disbursement into the air. Direct contact thus becomes the greatest factor in its transmission from person to person. These conclusions were reached after extended experiments in the inoculation of monkeys with the virus of the disease. As a natural infection this disease seems to be peculiar to man. Since the disease attacks by preference young children and infants whose nasal and mouth secretions are wiped away by mothers or nurses, it is plain that these persons should use the greatest precautions not to become carriers of infection. The most scrupulous cleanliness should be observed and any linen or other articles liable to infection should be followed. There should be no delay in summoning a physician when there is the slightest suspicion of the disease. Infantile paralysis is far too serious for delays or the taking of chances.

The School Problem.
As far as present conditions are concerned Oklahoma parents need feel no apprehension in sending their children to school. There is not a single community in the entire state where this would involve risk. Should there arise any emergency the state health board and the local authorities will without delay take such action as may be necessary for the protection of the school children.

No parent need feel any fear that he is exposing his child to unknown dangers. The policy of the state board of health has been and will be one of full and prompt publicity in regard to the actual facts. Exaggerated rumors and unfounded stories are discouraged, but no effort will be made to conceal from the public actual conditions. Where there is any danger it will probably be made known. No parent will have any cause to suspect that his child will be submitted to any risk because of a policy of concealment. The public will be kept informed of the real situation, not only in given communities, but throughout the entire state.


