

MOSQUITO FLEET IN NIGHT DRILL WARS ON FAKE "SUBMARINES" WITH DUMMY PERISCOPES

Motorboats representing submarines and containing dummy periscopes have been attacked at night by the mosquito fleet in and around New York. The breaking in of New York's motorboat fleet as an auxiliary to the navy is far from an easy task. Captain L. H. Kaiser, senior officer present in command of the battleship New Jersey, mother ship for the motorboat fleet, is well satisfied with the work done, however. Under the supervision of Lieutenant P. W. Wilcox, United States navy, who has had charge of the details of the motorboat drill, their owners

have been put through stiff paces. There have been maneuvers in squadron formation, attacks by some motorboats, backed by hydro aeroplanes, spying out mines and destroyers, while other motorboats and destroyers defend certain waters at the entrances to the Ambrose and Swash channels. Then there have been night drills with screened lights, practice in signaling with the Ardois and other apparatus. The drill periods are from 8:30 to 11:30 a. m., from 1:30 to 4 p. m. and from 8 to 10 p. m. Dummy periscopes on small boats have been used to represent submarines, and floating and anchored mines for the motorboats to dodge were placed everywhere. Group A was assigned to the battleship New Jersey, with Lieutenant Keep in charge. The Sunbeam II, with R. B. Roosevelt as commander, was made its flagship. His fleet consists of P. T. Rothschild's Lillian II, August Belmont Jr.'s Barracuda and C. B. Parker's Louise. Group B, assigned to

MEXICANS TO PAY RESPECTS TO WILSON

DURING WILSON'S VISIT TO NEW LONDON, WHERE SISTER IS ILL, MEXICANS WILL MEET WILSON ON MAYFLOWER.

New London, Conn., Sept. 12.—The Mexican members of the joint American-Mexican commission, which is studying a means of restoring order in Mexico, will be given an opportunity to pay their respects to Wilson, who is here at the bedside of his sister, Mrs. Howe, who is critically ill. The meeting will be arranged, it has been suggested, in a message of sympathy by the foreigners to President Wilson and has been transmitted by Secretary Lane. The meeting will take place on the Mayflower, which is anchored in front of the hotel, where the commission is in session.

EUROPEAN NEWS AND VIEWS.

London, Sept. 11.—The production of new plays and preparation for the races are signs that the people of England are in better spirits than they have been since the beginning of the war. The metropolis is fuller than ever before at this time of year. But there are drastic changes in the

surface life of London. Some days the streets seem a part of Australia, another day they are Canadian or South African, again they seem to be a part of the Highlands of Scotland, or Lancashire or Yorkshire. The licensing laws have been so altered that every day is a Sunday to the thirsty man. The bus conductors have "joined up" and have been replaced by young women of a new and unplaceable type. Motor wagons of the great dry goods stores are also mostly driven by women. Woman has come into her own. King Constantine of Greece, whose country is particularly prominent just now because of its attitude toward the war, does not like to be considered pro-German. He says his sympathies are for the Entente Allies and he is always very angry when accused of being influenced by his wife and brother-in-law. Any allusion to his wife's nationality he considers a personal insult, and as he is quick tempered and suspicious one has to be very careful not to touch his weak point lest the king bursts into fury. Workmen and upholsterers are busy turning upside down Pope Benedict's private apartments, removing furniture, scrubbing, painting and decorating. The tastes of the aristocratic pontiff differ greatly from those of his peasant born predecessor, and although austere simplicity may be a fitting setting for "the servant of the servants of the Lord," Benedict IV seems to incline toward the opinion that the vicar of Christ on earth should surround himself with the attributes of awe and majesty. That Germany depends greatly upon Alsace and Lorraine for her mineral wealth, is the opinion of certain prominent economists who point out that it is only since the war that France has realized that it is the soil of the lost provinces which has made Germany's fortune.

It is declared that the possession of Lorraine has been the strength of Germany, that it is from there she derives her metallurgical supremacy, the cause of her political hegemony, and that it is in direct consequence of her grip on the few miles of Lorraine soil taken in 1871 and of those other mining districts now occupied by her in Belgium and northern France that she has so far been able to hold her own against a world of foes.

DEMOCRATS TO STUMP KANSAS.

Bryan, Glynn, James and Lewis Are Among Speakers to Visit State. Topeka, Kan., Sept. 13.—At least six leaders of national prominence in the democratic party will campaign in Kansas next month, it was announced today.

The democrats plan to use two former progressive leaders, Francis J. Heney of California and Bainbridge Colby of New York. William Jennings Bryan will make a special trip through the state next month as will Martin J. Glynn, former governor of New York and Senator Ollie James of Kentucky. Senator J. Hamilton Lewis of Illinois and W. B. Burke of the treasury department also have been assigned to Kansas for the campaign, it was announced.
