**RUSSIAN LOSSES LARGE.**

**Casualties During Offensive on Eastern Front Placed at 1,250,000.**

Berlin, Oct. 7.—Casualties among the Russian armies during this year's offensive on the eastern front, according to cautious calculations, says the Overseas News Agency, have been at least 1,250,000 officers and men. According to conservative Danish calculations, the news agency adds, Russia, during the first two years of the war, lost considerably more than 6,000,000 men. Wounded men who returned to the front are not included in this estimate.

**MINE MANAGER WAS KIDNAPED**

ONE PERSON DEAD AND FOUR SUSPECTS UNDER ARREST IN COLORADO AS RESULT OF ATTEMPT TO HOLD UP MAN.

**ASKED FOR RANSOM**

Captives Sought Fifteen Thousand Dollars for Release of Mine Manager, Whom They Held for Two days in Colorado.

Oak Creek, Colo., Oct. 7.—With one person dead and four suspects under arrest at Steamboat Springs, Sheriff Chivington and deputies are pursuing half a dozen members of the band that kidnaped R. M. Perry, coal mine manager, Wednesday, and held him for two days under fifteen thousand dollars ransom.

Perry late yesterday grabbed a revolver from one of his abductors, killed his guard, and escaped.

**Germans Open Polish School.**

Galveston, Tex., Oct. 7.—The United States engineering launch Neuces was rammed by a fifteen-foot swordfish yesterday while in the intercoastal canal between Caney creek and the Brazos river, according to Capt. Geo. Predergast, commodore of the engineers' dredging fleet, who was on the launch when the attack occurred. A big hole was made in the Neuces below the water line, but she was kept afloat. The fish was shot and hauled aboard. The sword measured five feet in length, Captain Predergast said.
